The Human Rights Toolkit is designed to support courts to develop a strategy and action plan for their courts to institutionalise and foster human rights. It aims to increase the ability of judicial and court officers to apply human rights in their daily work and practice to improve the quality of justice provided by courts. The Human Rights Toolkit will provide partner courts with an over-arching perspective on how human rights principles link together across multiple aspects of courts' work.



The *Gender and Family Violence Toolkit* aims to improve the accessibility and responsiveness of courts to victims of gender and family violence. The toolkit provides practical approaches to assist partner courts in assessing how accessible and responsive their court services are to victims of violence. It provides practical tools to assess how accessible and responsive court services are and strategies on how to: improve efforts and track progress through implementing action plans; promote community awareness; and the need for accountability of perpetrators.
