Orders sought

1. Pursuant to ss 37AF(1)(a), and 37AF(1)(b)(i) and (iv) of the Federal Court Act the disclosure or publication of:
 - a. the content of the Nation Reports comprising Attachments A to EE of Schedule C of the NSW Murray Darling Basin Fractured Rock Water Resource Plan at Court Book Vol 3, Tabs 1- 25 (**Nation Reports**) identified in Amended Annexure 1 of these orders;
 - b. para [33] of the submissions of the Commonwealth respondents dated 20 December 2024;
 - c. the extracts from the Nation Reports quoted in paras [26] and [28] of the affidavit of Nadja Zimmermann affirmed 8 February 2025;
 - d. at page 39, item 418 of Annexure 1 filed on 11 April 2025: the words immediately after "Page 2660" to the end of the sentence;
 - e. at page 83, item 418 of the Amended Annexure 1: the words immediately after "Page 2660:" up to "The 7 words...", and
 - f. the yellow, blue and green highlighted content in the highlighted copy of the Nation Reports provided by the Applicant to the Court and Respondents

is prohibited until the expiry of the period provided for in R36.03 of the Federal Court Rules (**Appeal Period**) or, if an appeal is lodged, until the further order of the Court.
2. The disclosure or publication of the information referred to in order (1) is expressly permitted between:
 - a. the Federal Court judge presiding in the matter;
 - b. essential court staff; and
 - c. the Parties and their legal representatives.
3. Upon the expiry of the Appeal Period, if no appeal is lodged, the materials referred to in order (1), above be returned to the Commonwealth.
4. These orders do not operate in respect of copies of the Nations Reports referred to in order (1) other than those provided, tendered or disclosed in this proceeding.



Interim orders sought

1. Pursuant to s 17(4) of the *Federal Court of Australia Act 1976* (Cth) (**Federal Court Act**), the hearing of this Interlocutory Application, and any parts of the hearing of the principal Application in which the information the subject of Order (2), below, is disclosed be conducted in the absence of the public.
2. Pursuant to ss 37AI(1) and 37AF(1)(b)(iv) of the Federal Court Act, throughout the Commonwealth of Australia the disclosure or publication of:
 - a. the Nation Reports, as defined in the Commonwealth Submissions at [32] and comprising Attachments A to EE of Schedule C of the NSW Murray Darling Basin Fractured Rock Water Resource Plan at Court Book Vol 2, Part 4, Tab 8;
 - b. the Interlocutory Application itself, including:
 - i. this Interlocutory Application,
 - ii. the Applicant submissions filed on 9 February 2025, and
 - iii. the affidavit of Emily Jane Long affirmed and filed on 9 February 2025
 is prohibited until further order of the Court.
3. The disclosure or publication of the information referred to in these orders to and between the following persons is expressly permitted between:
 - a. the Federal Court judge presiding in the matter;
 - b. essential court staff; and
 - c. the Parties and their legal representatives.
4. By Tuesday 25 February, the Applicant and the Commonwealth Respondents are to confer, and agree:
 - a. whether the Nation Reports are tendered in whole or part, and if the latter,
 - b. a schedule identifying those parts of the Nation Reports that will form part of the record and in relation to which final suppression orders are sought.
5. This Interlocutory Application be listed for directions on a date convenient to the Court.

- “Many of their important ceremonial and cultural sites have been adversely impacted.”
- “This strongly affects their ability to pass on cultural knowledge.”
- “The Euahlayi people want water returned to their Country so they can replenish their spiritual and cultural connections.”
