For the first event in the 2015 'Judges in Conversation' series, the Hon. Justice Jessup will be in conversation with Professor Neil Duxbury on the topic:

"Sources of Law and Fundamental Rights"

Professor Neil Duxbury is Professor of Law at the London School of Economics. He is the author of *Random Justice* (OUP, 1999), *Patterns of American Jurisprudence* (OUP, 1995), *Frederick Pollock and the English Juristic Tradition* (OUP, 2004), *The Nature and Authority of Precedent* (CUP, 2008) and *Elements of Legislation* (CUP, 2012).

Professor Duxbury is in Melbourne to teach 'Law-making: Legislatures and Courts' in the Melbourne Law Masters program: www.law.unimelb.edu.au/masters

The Hon. Justice Christopher Jessup was appointed to the Federal Court of Australia in June 2006. He graduated with honours in Economics (in 1968) and Law (in 1970) from Monash University. He completed his PhD at London University in 1974. He signed the Roll of Counsel in Victoria in 1975 and practised continuously as a barrister from then until his appointment to the Court in 2006. He was appointed one of Her Majesty's Counsel in 1987. He has served on the Victorian Bar Council (as Chairman in 1992-1993) and on other committees for the Victorian Bar and the Law Council of Australia. He was Chairman of the Federal Litigation Section of the Law Council for four years in the mid-1990s.
