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I, Jessica Border of Level 2, 37 St Georges Terrace in the State of Western Australia, Solicitor, affirm:

 I am a Solicitor at the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO). I have worked as a lawyer for the EDO since 6 December 2022. Under the supervision of Clare Lakewood, Special Counsel, Safe Climate (Gas), EDO, the EDO acts for the Applicant (Ms Raelene Cooper) in this proceeding, and

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for Ms Cooper and Ms Josie Alec in respect of their dealings with Woodside Energy Group (Woodside Energy).

- The contents of this affidavit are true and correct to the best of my knowledge or belief. Where information is not within my direct knowledge, I have stated the source of that information.
- This is the second affidavit I have deposed in this proceeding. The first affidavit I deposed was on 17 August 2023 (First Border Affidavit). Where I have defined terms in the First Border Affidavit, I use those defined terms in this affidavit.
- I have reviewed business records held by the EDO in relation to the matters the subject of this affidavit and where I refer to email correspondence sent by or received from employees of the EDO where I have not been a named recipient to that correspondence, my knowledge of that correspondence comes from my review of those business records.
- 5. Where the notation [JLB-2.#] appears in this affidavit, it refers to a document in the bundle which is now produced and shown to me at the time I affirm this affidavit, being a document marked JLB-2.#, and a true copy of that document form Annexure JLB-2 to this affidavit.
- Where I depose to matters about Ms Alec and Ms Cooper and their knowledge and belief, that information is derived from conversations I have had with Ms Alec and Ms Cooper.

Purpose of Affidavit

7. This affidavit is made in support of an application for interlocutory relief following receipt of notification from the Second and Third Respondent, by letter under the cover of an email received at 7:43pm on 5 September 2023, giving notice of their intention to commence activity purportedly pursuant to the Seismic Survey EP. [JLB-2.1, p 27]

The Applicant

- 8. Murujuga, also known as the Burrup Peninsula, is an area located in the Pilbara region in far north Western Australia.
- 9. I am informed by Ms Josie Alec and Ms Raelene Cooper (the Applicant), and believe this to be a true account of their knowledge and belief:
 - (a) Ms Alec:
 - (i) is a Kuruma Mardudhunera lore woman and a Traditional Custodian of Murujuga;
 - (ii) has ancestral and bloodline ties to Kuruma, Mardudhunera, Ngarluma and Yindjibarndi peoples;
 - (iii) was given the totem animal bungarra or sand goanna;
 - (b) Ms Cooper:

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- (i) is a Mardudhunera lore woman, elder and a Traditional Custodian of Murujuga;
- (ii) was given the totem animals eagle and kangaroo;
- (iii) has been a member of Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC) since its inception;
- (iv) was the Chairperson of MAC between 2016 and 2017;
- (v) resigned from the board of MAC on 11 February 2022;
- (vi) holds and carries the whale Dreaming story;
- (c) Ms Alec and Ms Cooper:
 - (i) were taught about the matters about Country and responsibility as told to me and set out in this affidavit by:
 - in Ms Alec's case, her grandfather (who she speaks to frequently in a spiritual and cultural sense as an old person who has passed away) and mother;
 - in Ms Cooper's case, her mother Doreen Cooper, and grandmother Clare Alec/Cooper; and
 - (C) their old people and ancestors whose DNA exists in the ngurra (the "place of belonging") at Murujuga and in their own bloodline, such that when they put their feet on Country they can communicate with their old people and ancestors who share Dreaming stories and other knowledge;
 - (ii) have important cultural responsibilities and obligations relating to places in the northwest of Western Australia, including but not limited to Murujuga and Pannawonica, and Australia more generally;
- (d) Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are unable to fully tell their story or explain their connection to Country and responsibilities:
 - (i) on paper and through the written word;
 - (ii) when they are not on Country;
 - to audiences of mixed genders, as some of their responsibilities and connections to Country concern women's business.
- 10. Ms Cooper is bringing this litigation in the public interest pursuant to her obligations as a Mardudhunera lore woman, elder and a Traditional Custodian of Murujuga to protect Murujuga, her songlines, culture and the survival of all humans.

Songlines and connection to Country and responsibilities

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- 11. I am informed by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper, and believe, that the following is a true account of their knowledge and belief passed to them by their ancestors and old people.
 - (a) As Traditional Custodians, Ms Alec and Cooper are connected to the sea, animals and Country through their hearts, energy and songlines, all of which are connected and interrelated and cannot be separated.
 - (b) Ms Alec and Ms Cooper connect to their bloodline, old people and songlines through Country, including the rocks at Murujuga, which are encrypted with ancient stories that keep connection to the bloodline and songlines alive and well.
 - (c) The rocks at Murujuga symbolise stories, the totems (the depicted artwork) whether representing plants or animals – and tell a story of their history, and how long they've been there.
 - (d) There are ancient beings, animals and plants that are no longer on earth, and as people. Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are here because the ancient beings, animals and plans have no voice.
 - (e) The sea is the source of energy for all life, it holds the codes that are encrypted in each person's body and the songlines and is the lifeforce for the world.
 - (f) The places where the saltwater from the sea and the freshwater from the land connect are where the biggest energy lines are, and that connection is a force of creation relevant to a Dreaming story.
 - (g) Songlines extend out from the land, through the sea and around the globe, connecting places, people and animals to each other, creating migratory patterns for animals and telling animals of the right time to birth and eat.
 - (h) Songlines are essential to the survival of human beings and the ngurra or Mother Earth.
 - (i) As women, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are holders of the water, kinship and star lore which requires the ability to love, nurture, be heart-centred.
 - (j) As holders of women's lore, they have important cultural responsibilities and obligations including to:
 - (i) protect, preserve and promote the *ngurra* in a way it deserves to keep it safe;
 - rise up and take action to protect their sea, animals and country and ensure Mother Earth is protected;
 - (iii) to listen to Mother Earth look after Country, to stand up and connect to country, to listen to the ocean and to what the animals are saying – to protect Mother Earth and everything within it – from the whales to the amoeba and tiny crustaceans;
 - (iv) to listen to and speak on behalf of the plants and animals;

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- heal generational trauma to 'clear' the songlines and ensure energy flows freely through those songlines;
- (vi) nurture, love and bring divine feminine energy back to earth;
- (vii) speak for Country in relation to women's lore and about women's perspectives that men are not able to speak about;
- (viii) heal songlines that may be distorted, including by travelling to other places to activate other First Nations peoples songlines for which they hold the stories, and to activate their own songlines with other Traditional Owners, such as the Gunditjmara mob in Warnambool with whom they recently had a whale Dreaming ceremony, the Gomeroi mob and Munupi clan, with whom they share Dreaming stories.
- (k) Their cultural obligations and responsibilities are sometimes overwhelming, or scary, but they are compelled to do these things – it is the reason they exist;
- (I) To fulfil these responsibilities and cultural obligations, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper were born with cultural gifts that allow them to speak to animals, connect to Country, feel energy everywhere and undertake cultural protocols, practices and tasks;
- (m) When Ms Alec and Ms Cooper stand on Country, when they put their feet on the ground:
 - (i) they are connected, they sing to their ancestors and let their old people know they are in a certain place, and wait for guidance from their old people, who share knowledge with them, and Ms Alec and Ms Cooper hold that knowledge for everyone in their bloodline;
 - (ii) they feel Mother Earth's heartbeat and feel everything Mother Earth does and says.
- 12. I am told by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper that their strongly held belief is that further information about certain matters described above can only be disclosed to people who are born as a biological female and living as a female in accordance with their beliefs and customary practices.
- Ms Alec and Ms Cooper founded the organisation Save Our Songlines, established as an unincorporated entity in or around February 2022.
- 14. Save Our Songlines is:
 - (a) an organisation dedicated to protection of Country, especially Murujuga, from industry which may damage it, and the cultural heritage connected to it, including the Songlines connected to it;
 - (b) a means for members of Save Our Songlines to:


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- (i) engage and network with and receive information from people with similar interests and visions;
- (ii) provide cultural advice to and engage in cultural healing with other Traditional Owners:
- (c) not currently receiving any funding, but has received funding from non-government organisations in the past and is likely to in the future.

Ms Cooper's current financial position

15. Ms Cooper has told me and I believe that she:



- (f) occasionally receives reimbursement from Save Our Songlines for fuel and accommodation costs incurred, and time spent, on Save Our Songlines work, when there is funding available through that organisation. There has not been any funding available to reimburse her for expenses related to Save Our Songlines work in 2023.
- 16. Ms Cooper has told me, and I believe, that on the basis of her financial position set out in paragraph [15] above, she is unable to provide the usual undertaking as to damages.
- 17. She has also told me, and I believe, that she is concerned that if she were made bankrupt as a result of a costs order in these proceedings, she would not be able to fulfil certain obligations like sitting on the board of organisations such as MAC or the Wirrawandi Aboriginal Corporation. While she does not sit on any boards currently, it is important to her that she have the option to do so in future, to ensure that she can put her views forward in those spaces and fulfil her cultural obligations.

Ms Cooper's Connection to Murujuga

- 18. I am informed by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper and believe:
 - (a) as Traditional Custodians, they are oral storytellers;
 - there has been no Mardudhunera woman representative on the MAC Circle of Elders (the body that advises MAC on cultural issues) for five years;

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- (c) they hold women's lore and stories that only they as Mardudhunera hold and can share, and they are concerned that they have not been able to share this information;
- (d) the cultural information and knowledge they hold is not for the most part recorded in writing;
- (e) they have information to share with Woodside Energy and need appropriate time to share their story with Woodside Energy to ensure protection of the whales and songlines; they need people to comprehend their story in a specific way; and
- (f) this information needs to be shared at the appropriate place, namely on Country.

Whales

- 19. I am informed by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper, who I understand were informed by their ancestors and old people and their own experiences, and believe:
 - (a) whales carry important songlines, the whale Dreaming, and connection between land and sea;
 - (b) as the biggest animal on earth, the whale has the greatest heart connection to the songlines, people and animals and carries the songlines around the ocean, connecting places;
 - (c) other animals, such as turtles, dolphins, dugongs, and krill follow the whales' songlines, because they're all connected together – the whale creates a path for the other animals like 'grading a road';
 - (d) there is a large energy line that exists off the coast of Murujuga and runs through the area that Woodside Energy refers to as the Environment that May Be Affected (EMBA), and Ms Cooper is aware of this as the EMBA is in the whales' migration line – both whales that migrate north to south and south to north pass through this area;
 - (e) the Whale Dreaming story has a strong connection to the heart centre in each person, this story helps people to open up and to realise, understand and raise awareness of the environment and everything humans are connected to;
 - (f) in their own families, female whales have a caretaker or midwife role, and those who are connected to the Whale Dreaming and carry the women's lore also have obligations as caretakers of the earth:
 - (g) the women's lore that Ms Alec and Ms Cooper carry is the songline of the whale, which is important for sustaining the creation of all animals and humans;
 - (h) when Ms Alec and Ms Cooper and their people stand on Country they are connected to their songlines through the rocks. As holders of women's lore, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper put healing energy into the rocks and use that to heal the songlines;

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- (i) Ms Alec and Ms Cooper connect to the whales like this through their songlines, they sing to the whales, the whales feel that song and the connection through their hearts, regardless of the distance;
- the whales tell Ms Alec and Ms Cooper a story, and Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are the people who feel and who are connected to that story;
- (k) Ms Alec and Ms Cooper have that feeling of connection inside them all the time, they live and breathe it, they are it and everything about it.

Disruption

- 20. The following information has been provided to me by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper based upon their understanding of the activity proposed by the Seismic Survey EP to be undertaken by Woodside, and its disruptive effects:
 - (a) that seismic testing involves loud, regular underwater pulses of sound and vibrations;
 - the sound and vibrations are created using huge amounts of pressure and the sound happens every 5/6 seconds;
 - (c) the sound and vibrations are emitted from an airgun array that will be towed at a depth of between 6 and 8 metres:
 - (d) the sound and vibrations reflected off the ocean floor will be detected by sensors connected to long cables towed behind the vessel. These cables are known as 'streamers'. The streamers are 8km long and 1.5km wide, taking up a huge area in the ocean;
 - (e) those blasts of sound, and the energy emitted by the blasts, interfere with:
 - (i) the frequencies of the songlines;
 - (ii) the whales' sonar and communication systems, which operate at the same decibel level as the blasting frequency;
 - (iii) the ability of the whale to sing and to hear its songs;
 - (f) because each animal uses songlines for migration, breeding and feeding, the disruption or distortion to the songlines causes the animals to become disoriented, confused or lost;
 - (g) when a whale's songline is disrupted, it won't be able to swim properly or its tail will stop moving;
 - (h) it is their understanding that whales can feel these energies and communicate 1,600km away and are losing their direction and intentionally beaching because they don't want to be in the water;

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- seismic testing that is occurring around the world is disrupting the whales, and the whales are calling out for help – for example, the death of a pod of pilot whales at Cheyne's Beach near Albany, Wester Australia recently;
- (j) because Ms Cooper and Ms Alec are connected to the songlines, if the songlines are disrupted, their people are disrupted – their widdart (heart) is disconnected – like the whales, their feet get lost and they don't know where to go anymore.
- 21. I am informed by Ms Cooper and believe that when a whale's migration pattern is disrupted through disturbance to a songline or interruption to the frequency that a whale communicates on, it is equivalent to:
 - (a) getting dumped in a wave and not knowing which way is up; or
 - (b) taking the same route to work, every day for your whole life, and then one day coming across a broken bridge or blocked road and not knowing what to do, or being unable to take an alternative route.
- 22. I am informed by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper and believe that they are very concerned about the seismic survey activities because of the impact they will have on:
 - (i) whales and other species including turtles and dugongs;
 - (ii) songlines;
 - (iii) the spiritual health and wellbeing of Murujuga and all the plants and animals present on Murujuga and connected to the songlines in and around Murujuga;
 - (iv) the peoples connected to Murujuga, including their own families; and
 - (v) the future of ngurra, Mother Earth, and all her inhabitants in general.

Relevant communications and meetings between the Applicant and Save our Songlines and Woodside Energy

- 23. I am aware from my involvement in my capacity as solicitor for Ms Alec and Ms Cooper that they have been involved in meetings and correspondence with various representatives from Woodside Energy in relation to the Seismic Survey EP.
- 24. On 14 March 2023, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper met with representatives from Woodside Energy. In addition to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper, attendees included Skylah-Lee Dawson, Mark Clifton, Clare Lakewood and Ruby Hamilton of EDO and from Woodside Energy. The meeting was held on country in Karratha.
- 25. On 16 March 2023 at 5:16pm, Ms Lakewood and Ms Hamilton received an email from at Woodside that purported to summarise the meeting on 14 March 2023. [JLB-2.2]

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- 26. I am informed by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper and verily believe that they consider that the 14 March meeting was an initial introduction between themselves and Woodside that did not form a part of a substantive consultation on any of Woodside's Environment Plans.
- 27. On 24 March 2023, Ms Hamilton sent a letter by email to which confirmed Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's understanding that the meeting on 14 March 2023 was an initial meeting, and was provided to "confirm the outcomes and next steps from that meeting, as well as to emphasise some of the important matters raised in that meeting". [JLB-2.3]
- 28. On 29 March 2023 at 12:55pm, Ms Hamilton received an email from in response to the letter of 24 March 2023. In that email, which was directed to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper, among other things agreed to meeting protocols for further meetings and recorded that in the meeting on 14 March 2023, Woodside Energy "heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us." It also set out further matters that Woodside Energy was interested in learning from Ms Alec and Ms Cooper, and noted that it didn't expect this information to be provided in writing. [JLB-2.4]
- 29. On 6 April 2023, the EDO sent a letter by email to NOPSEMA, copying Woodside Energy, advising NOPSEMA of its view that Woodside Energy had not yet complied with the requirements of reg 10A(g) of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) (Environment Regulations). - On 17 April 2023, Woodside Energy sent a letter by email to NOPSEMA, copying the EDO, responding to EDO's letter of 6 April 2023, and, among other matters, advising NOPSEMA of its view that it had consulted sufficiently with Ms Alec and Ms Cooper. [JLB-2.6]
- 31. On 18 April 2023 at 2:56pm the EDO sent an email to on behalf of Ms Alec and Ms Cooper. In that email the EDO said, among other things, that:

Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.


- 32. The EDO did not receive a response to the email sent 18 April 2023.
- 33. On 8 May 2023, the EDO sent a further email, referring to the email sent on 18 April 2023 at 2:54pm, and said:

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We refer to our email below. We have not had any response to date, and write again to enquire whether Woodside wishes to propose dates that we can put to our clients for consultation regarding the seismic survey EP.

- 35. On 15 May 2023 at 2:34pm, the EDO sent an email stating they were confirming instructions and would revert as soon as possible. [JLB-2.10]
- 36. On 1 June 2023 at 9:23pm, the EDO sent an email to provide that Ms Alec and Ms Cooper were "available and would like to meet in Karratha on the morning of Tuesday, 13 June 2023". [JLB-2.11]
- 37. On Wednesday, 7 June 2023 at 6:46am, the EDO received an email from in response, also copying NOPSEMA. The email, among other things, confirmed Woodside's availability to meeting in Karratha on the morning of Tuesday, 13 June 2023; laid out a draft agenda for the meeting; confirmed meeting protocols; and indicated the four Woodside attendees at the meeting. - 38. On Friday, 9 June 2023 at 1:58pm, the EDO received an email from

Dear Ruby, Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

Thanks for suggesting a meeting next Tuesday 14 June in Karratha.

We refer to the emails below.

We would be grateful if you can please confirm by 5pm today that the meeting will go ahead, or alternatively, provide some other dates for us to work to. (There are a number of flight and other logistics that need to be confirmed by 5pm today in order for that meeting to progress on Tuesday).

Please can you also let us know:

The preferred time for the proposed meeting

The preferred meeting location

Attendees Added items to the draft Agenda

We look forward to hearing from you.

39. On Friday, 9 June 2023 at 2:20pm, the EDO received a further email from the date of the meeting to 13 June rather than 14 June.

40. On Friday, 9 June 2023 at 5:05pm, the EDO sent an email to

We confirm the meeting for next Tuesday, 13 June 2023. Our clients are available in the morning of that day.

We will confirm the other details as soon as possible once we have instructions from our clients.

41. On Friday, 9 June 2023 at 5:09pm, sent an email to the EDO. It said:

Thanks for your email. We are unavailable because, as foreshadowed in our email, flights and other logistics timed out at 5pm for us.

Let's regroup next week and work through alternate dates.

42. On Saturday, 10 June 2023, the EDO sent an email to , marked "URGENT". It said:

As Ruby indicated yesterday, and as we originally proposed, our clients are available and hope to proceed with a meeting at 10am on Tuesday, 13 June 2023. As noted in previous correspondence, our clients greatly value face-to-face meetings on Country, and have limited availability. Solicitors from the EDO have also arranged to be in Karratha on Tuesday also.

Our clients are hopeful of a productive meeting and would be happy to work with whoever is available from Woodside, even if this means the meeting proceeds in a more limited capacity (i.e. a shorter/different time, or fewer Woodside attendees than initially proposed).

In the interests of determining whether there is a way we can proceed, I invite you to call me directly on [...].

Acknowledging the logistics we will have to manage if the meeting does not proceed, or is to occur at different time or date, I am available at your convenience over the weekend. I welcome you, or whoever at Woodside can most efficiently handle logistics, giving me a call, and look forward to finding a productive path forward.

- 43. No response to that email was received over the weekend by the EDO.
- 44. On Monday, 12 June 2023 at 11:00am, the EDO sent a further email to find the contents of which:

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- (a) confirmed that Ms Alec and Ms Cooper wished to keep the existing arrangement for a consultation meeting on the morning of 13 June 2023 in Karratha;
- (b) noted that as at the morning of 12 June 2023 when the email was sent, there were still five flights from Perth to Karratha that would see any attendees at Perth arrive in time for a meeting in the morning of 13 June 2023;
- (c) noted that at the last meeting at least one attendee from Woodside was based in Karratha;
- identified proposed amendments to the agenda for the meeting that had previously been suggested by Woodside;
- (e) advised that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and additionally Ms Hamilton and Ms Lakewood from the EDO, would be in attendance at the meeting.

45. On Monday, 12 June 2023 at 12:58pm, sent the EDO a further email. It said, among other things:

We'll set the proposed draft agenda as per notes below (but please let us know if you would like to edit or update it). So that the meeting can be rescheduled, please let us know dates that Josie. Raelene and Save Our Songlines are next available to meet.

46. On Monday, 12 June 2023 at 1:26pm, the EDO sent an email to in response. It said:

As noted, our clients and EDO solicitors are available in Karratha for a meeting at 10am on Tuesday 14 [sic] June 2023 and would prefer to proceed with that meeting if at all possible. Our suggestions below include currently available flights, and/or adjusting the scope and personnel for the meeting.

We have instructions from both our clients that the meeting can proceed with Ms Cooper in attendance on Tuesday afternoon or anytime on Wednesday. While the Tuesday morning meeting time would allow both our clients to attend, we are instructed that this alternate format would still be acceptable in order for a meeting to proceed with EDO solicitors present. If it is the only option for Woodside, our clients can meet on Thursday afternoon.

47. No response to that email was received by the EDO.

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48. On Wednesday, 14 June 2023 at 9:42am, the EDO sent a further email to said:

We have not heard back in relation to the below email, or been able to contact you by phone.

Our clients are still willing to meet at the times specified below, while EDO solicitors are available in Karratha. We can arrange for Woodside to join by phone or videoconference if needed.

49. On Wednesday, 14 June 2023 at 11:00am, the EDO received an email from

Thanks for your emails

Our team is not available to meet this week.

We are available on the following dates in Karratha:

 20, 26, 27, 29, 30 June. (School holidays in July mean that the full team is not available 3-16 July). The June dates allow us to follow the agreed protocols (including having a female only team). We have a preference for an afternoon meeting if that would work for you.

Please let us know which of those dates is suitable.

We note your preference for a meeting in Karratha. We can meet in Karratha and alternatively, are also available via Teams if preferrable.

In the meantime, we are open to receiving comments / queries / requests via email if that would be more efficient.

- 50. On 28 June 2023 the EDO sent by email a letter to NOPSEMA on behalf of Ms Alec and Ms Cooper, copying Woodside Energy. The letter said, among other things:
 - that they understood from a review of the NOPSEMA website that the Seismic Survey EP was under assessment;

The issue of whether to record the meeting was discussed for some time and resolved at or about 10:10am. It was resolved that the meeting would be recorded and the recording distributed to attendees. The attendees then started discussing matters relevant to the Seismic Survey EP. The meeting concluded at around 11:20am.

- (i) Ms Cooper noted she was happy to have those conversations at a later meeting and she was focused on the activities and how they would affect songlines, ngurra and animals, and noted that she was happy to wonga (speak) with Woodside Energy further;
- (j) Ms Alec noted:
 - (i) she wanted to go through the information that had been provided;
 - (ii) her interests lay in the songlines, and where the freshwater and saltwater meet, noting that their main objective was to keep the songlines and energy lines safe as that is their job;
 - (iii) she was wary of seismic testing in itself and wanted the opportunity to look into how seismic testing had been used over the world;

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- songlines are the impacts of energy and energy lines, and that seismic testing creates different sonar energy frequencies in the water, and this affects songlines;
- she would assist Woodside Energy in its understanding of songlines and provide a cultural perspective from woman's lore;
- (vi) she, Ms Cooper and Ms Irvine-Stanes are not 'tick the box' people but people who know their business and know their Country inside out – physically, spiritually, emotionally – and their ancestors gifted them with the ability to look after it;
- (vii) they would come back with further information;
- (k) Woodside Energy asked where the saltwater met the freshwater and how Woodside Energy could minimise impacts and Ms Alec stated:
 - that was 'a conversation for another time' and that she would 'come back to it', noting she needed to look at the information;
 - that conversation was sacred, would need to be held on the ngurra, and is not something she would discuss by videoconference;





- 2. Our clients appreciate the opportunity to have a first meeting to discuss culturally appropriate protocols for undertaking consultation and begin to understand the activities comprising parts of the Scarborough Gas Project that are the subject of the:
 - a. Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey environment plan (Seismic Survey EP);
 - b. Scarborough Drilling and Completions environment plan (**Drilling and Completions EP**);
 - c. Scarborough Subsea Infrastructure and Installation environment plan (**Subsea Infrastructure EP**);
 - d. Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline Installation environment plan (Federal Waters Trunkline EP);
 - e. Scarborough Trunkline Installation (State waters) environment plan (**State Waters Trunkline EP**);

(collectively, **EP Activities**), so that they may assess how their interests, functions and activities will be affected, and work with Woodside to ensure impacts are acceptable, as low

- as reasonably practicable and consistent with the principles of ecologically sustainable development.
- 3. As we indicated by way of next steps at our meeting of 14 March 2023, we provide this letter to confirm the outcomes and next steps from that meeting, as well as to emphasise some of the important matters raised in that meeting.
- 4. Though, as discussed further below, our clients are concerned about Woodside's failure to tell our clients that Woodside considers them 'relevant persons', our clients appreciate that the State Waters Trunkline EP Summary dated February 2023¹ and submitted to the Minister for Mines and Petroleum on 22 February 2023² acknowledges them as such.
- 5. Our clients also appreciate that, as requested, only women attended the meeting with Woodside. We reiterate that the information shared about our clients' functions, interests and activities must be kept to women.

I. Summary of meeting

- 6. Our client explained (consistent with their correspondence to you of 22 July 2022) that their functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC). As explained at the meeting, our clients have distinct cultural heritage, their stories were not told as part of any consultation that may have occurred with MAC or as part of other surveys, and they want to ensure that Woodside is properly informed of the impacts and risks of the EP Activities on their functions, interests and activities.
- 7. Our clients raised particular concerns about the impacts that underwater activities that form part of the EP Activities might have on their functions, interests and activities.³ They also raised their concerns about the impacts of related greenhouse gas emissions on their functions, interests and activities; and the industrialisation of Murujuga.
- 8. The questions our clients asked at the meeting that required follow up are set out further, below, under heading IV. Responses to Questions Arising at the Meeting of 14 March 2023.
- 9. At this first meeting, which focused on explaining our clients' interests, we did not discuss any environment plan in detail.
- 10. All parties expressed their commitment to undertaking this consultation process.

II. Clarification of our clients' position

11. The email from of 16 March 2023 characterised our clients' position during consultation as being that:

[t]here is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to [our] clients['] culture and country.

- 12. This mischaracterises our clients' response to the question put to them by of Woodside in the meeting of 14 March 2023. asked our clients whether there is a way to proceed with the Scarborough Gas Project and protect the songlines. Our clients indicated that in their view there is not, and that the sea floor should not be dug up. While it is our clients' view that Woodside should not undertake the Scarbrough Gas Project because of the harm it will cause, that is different to a conclusion that there is "nothing that can be done" to minimise impacts or be respectful to our clients, their culture and their Country.
- 13. Our clients regard genuine consultation on the proposed EP Activities an important demonstration of respect for their functions, interests and activities. They anticipate that the consultation process which has just commenced, including provision of the information they have requested and the opportunity to respond will at least:
 - a. inform them of the full extent of how their functions, interests and activities may be affected;
 - enable the adoption of appropriate measures to address risks and impacts, including to ensure that the risks and impacts of the EP Activities are made acceptable and as low as reasonably practicable; and
 - c. ensure compliance with section 280 of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act 2006* (Cth).
- 14. The mischaracterisation of our clients' position in a way that implies nothing is to be gained from consulting them is inconsistent with the expressed commitment to consultation from all parties; and Woodside's obligations to:
 - a. provide sufficient information to allow our clients to understand how their functions, interests and activities may be affected;
 - b. adopt appropriate measures in response to our clients concerns; and
 - c. adequately convey to the regulator the nature of our clients' functions, interests and activities and the measures to be adopted to reduce impacts to those functions, interests and activities.⁴

III. Communication of Relevant Person Status

15. Our clients are relevant persons for purposes of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) and the Petroleum (Submerged Lands) (Environment) Regulations 2012 (WA). Woodside is required to provide them with sufficient information and a reasonable period for consultation on each of the environment plans.⁵

- 16. Our clients first provided written assertion of their rights to be consulted as 'relevant persons' for the purpose of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) on 6 June 2022. In correspondence of 24 November 2022, Woodside was asked to confirm that it considers our clients to be 'relevant persons' for the purpose of consultation.
- 17. Our clients did not receive a response to that request.
- 18. The State Waters Trunkline EP Summary dated January 2023⁶ and submitted to the WA Minister for Mines and Petroleum on 5 January 2023 identified the organisation our clients founded, Save Our Songlines, as a relevant person, but did not identify our clients as relevant persons.
- 19. As you confirmed at our meeting, a revised version of that environment plan submitted to the Minister for Mines and Petroleum on 22 February 2023 identifies our clients as relevant persons. Despite the explicit request, our clients were never notified by Woodside that Woodside considered them relevant persons.
- 20. Additionally, Woodside submitted the latest version of the State Waters Trunkline EP to the Minister for Mines and Petroleum before ever meeting with our clients. That is, it submitted the State Waters Trunkline EP before undertaking an appropriate level of consultation with our clients.⁸

IV. Acknowledgement of Responses to Questions Arising at Meeting of 14 March 2023

- 21. At the meeting our clients requested:
 - a. An explanation as to why Woodside is proceeding with the Scarborough Gas Project given:
 - i. the impact it will have on Murujuga and our clients' cultural heritage,
 - ii. the impacts of the greenhouse gas emissions from the project; and
 - iii. the possibility of other, less harmful projects Woodside might pursue;
 - b. A copy of the ethnographic survey Woodside has undertaken with MAC; and
 - c. Confirmation that fracking would not form part of the Scarborough Gas Project.
- 22. In response, email of 16 March 2023:
 - a. provided a link to Woodside's publicly available website about Scarborough and Pluto Train 2;9
 - b. advised the requested ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it with our clients;

- c. confirmed that there is to be no fracking undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.
- 23. We also requested that our clients be notified when documents are submitted to decisionmakers, and be provided with any material submitted to those decisionmakers that is public, or which relates to our clients' interests. This will ensure our clients are aware of information relevant to their interests in a timely manner. email did not respond to this request.

V. Next Steps

- 24. Our clients will review the information about the Federal Waters Subsea Infrastructure EP and the Seismic Survey EP, and consider whether it adequately answers the questions raised in their previous correspondence, and their response.
- 25. We will contact you once they have had the time needed to review and digest that information, and to arrange the next step in consultation. Our clients anticipate that they will require approximately six weeks to do this.
- 26. Given that the obligation to consult is to be discharged prior to submitting an environment plan to NOPSEMA,¹⁰ we request confirmation that Woodside will not submit these environment plans until that consultation is complete.
- 27. Confirmation that environment plans will not be submitted until our clients are properly notified is particularly important given Woodside's decision to submit its most recent version of the State Waters Trunkline EP without undertaking an appropriate level of consultation with our clients.¹¹



Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill — we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- <!--[if !supportLists]-->• <!--[endif]-->Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP

activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the take-aways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it

was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 Woodside Energy.
- Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: *The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.*
- Confirm fracking in relation to the Scarborough activities: There is no fracking to be undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.

"Relevant interested person" consultation requirements – Scarborough Trunkline Installation 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan

- 1. We act for Ms Josie Alec and Ms Raelene Cooper.
- 2. We refer to the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (**Seismic Survey EP**), submitted by Woodside Energy Scarborough Pty Ltd (**Woodside**) on or around 23 March 2023, which we understand is currently under assessment by NOPSEMA. The Seismic Survey EP is for a proposal to survey the Scarborough, North Scarborough and Jupiter gas fields.
- 3. We also refer to:
 - a. Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's letter to Woodside of 6 June 2022, into which you were copied (6 June 2022 Letter);
 - b. Woodside's letter to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper of 22 July 2022 (22 July 2022 Letter);
 - c. Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's letter to NOPSEMA of 26 September 2022 (26 September 2022 Letter), which attached a letter from Woodside to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper dated 22 July 2022 addressing the Seismic Survey EP;
 - d. NOPSEMA's letter to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper of 3 October 2022;
 - e. Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's letter to Woodside of 24 November 2022, into which you were copied (24 November 2022 Letter);

- f. A meeting between Ms Alec and Ms Cooper and representative of Woodside held on 14 March 2023 (**Woodside Meeting**);
- g. Woodside's email to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper of 17 March 2023, including "Attachment A 170323 Save Our Songlines Scarborough Seismic EP" (**Attachment A**), a copy of which is attached to this letter; and
- h. Our letter to Woodside of 24 March 2023, into which you were copied;
- i. Woodside's email to our clients of 29 March 2023, into which you were copied.
- 4. At the Woodside Meeting, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper outlined the general nature of their interests, functions and activities to Woodside; emphasised the importance of their requests relating to handling of gender-specific cultural knowledge; and confirmed their interest in continued consultation. Our clients understood the meeting to be an introductory first meeting and in that context did not share their stories and lore in detail. Our clients consider that, while Woodside should now understand the significance of our clients' cultural roles and responsibilities, the meeting should not be interpreted as a comprehensive account of our clients' interests and knowledge. The meeting did not proceed to any explicit discussion of the Seismic Survey EP or the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP (Seismic EP Activities). There was some specific discussion of Woodside's environment plan for the "Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline Installation" activity.

I. Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are Relevant Persons

- A. <u>Ms Alec and Ms Cooper have functions, interests and activities that may be affected by the Seismic EP Activities</u>
- 5. As you are aware, reg 11A(1) requires consultation with each authority, person and organisation meeting the definition of a relevant person, which includes any person or organisation whose functions, interests or activities may be affected by the activities to be carried out under the environment plan. A connection of traditional owners with sea country may constitute an interest for the purposes of reg 11A(1)(d).
- 6. As traditional custodians, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper have consistently asserted their status as relevant persons for the purpose of consultation on activities relating to the development of the Scarborough gas field,³ on the basis that their ongoing cultural practices, businesses, interests and activities may be affected by the development of the Scarborough gas field. In the Woodside

- Meeting, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper gave Woodside additional information about the nature of their connection and cultural responsibilities that may be affected by the Seismic EP Activities.⁴
- 7. Though Woodside has so far failed to respond directly to Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's request for confirmation that Woodside considers them relevant persons for the purpose of consultation, we understand that the environment plan Woodside submitted to the WA Minister for Mines and Petroleum on 9 March 2023 identifies Ms Alec and Ms Cooper as relevant persons along with Save Our Songlines, the organisation that they founded.⁵
- 8. As relevant persons, Woodside must consult with Ms Alec and Ms Cooper regarding the Seismic Survey EP, including by at least:
 - a. giving Ms Alec and Ms Cooper sufficient information to enable them to make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of the activity on the functions, interests or activities of the relevant person;
 - b. allowing a reasonable period for the consultation, including allowing time for a relevant person to respond to a project proponent with concerns.⁶
 - A. <u>Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC)</u>
- 9. The 6 June 2022 Letter made clear to Woodside that Ms Alec and Ms Cooper were unaware of any consultation that may have occurred with MAC, and were unaware of any efforts by Woodside to consult the MAC board, Elders or knowledge holders. This was reiterated at the meeting of 14 March 2023.
- 10. At the meeting of 14 March 2023, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper also explained that they were unaware of any consultation being undertaken with MAC; and that their knowledge of heritage sites was distinct from others who may have been involved in any heritage or ethnographic surveys undertaken with MAC.
- 11. Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are knowledge holders with cultural functions, interests and activities specific to their roles in the Mardudhunera and Marthudhunera/Kuruma language groups. It is their view that these functions, interests and activities are separate from those of MAC. Consultation with MAC therefore does not relieve Woodside of the obligation to consult our clients.

II. Woodside Has Not Provided Sufficient Information

12. Information should be in a form that is readily accessible and appropriate for the relevant person being consulted. Materials provided may include written forms, pictorial or other graphics, verbal briefings or presentations, and the use of other technologies. ⁷ Titleholders are encouraged to

- discuss expectations around the type and level of detail of information required with relevant persons early when commencing consultation.⁸
- 13. In the 6 June 2022 Letter, among other issues raised, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper sought from Woodside "copies of any draft Cultural Heritage Management Plans, scientific studies or reviews held by Woodside, disclosure of who has been consulted, and or any other relevant information held by Woodside in relation to the Scarborough and related developments", to facilitate consultation.
- 14. Woodside responded in July 2022 to the effect that Woodside considered that Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's functions, interests and activities would not be affected by the Seismic EP Activities.⁹
- 15. In the 24 November 2022 Letter, among other issues raised, in order to assist in understanding how their functions, interests and activities would be affected, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper asked Woodside to provide:
 - a. copies of all draft Environment Plans and associated technical and other information for the Scarborough project;
 - b. any studies, research or other information held by Woodside relating to:
 - i. impacts and risks of the Scarborough project activities on cultural practices, sites, values, stories and songlines (not limited to "ethnographic sites"), including on marine fauna of cultural significance; and
 - ii. impacts and risks of industrial pollution from gas processing on cultural heritage at Murujuga;
 - c. any documents held by Woodside in relation to impacts on cultural heritage from the Pluto LNG facility, including section 18 approval documents, compliance reports, anthropological studies, site surveys or other data of this nature; and
 - d. any studies, reports or other information held by Woodside on the impacts of Woodside's existing and proposed activities on the World Heritage values or World Heritage listing process for Murujuga.
- 16. In response to their request for specific studies, report and documents that would assist Ms Alec and Ms Cooper to understand how their functions, interests and activities may be affected by the Seismic EP Activities:
 - a. By email on 16 March 2023, Woodside advised Ms Alec and Ms Cooper that it did not have permission to share the ethnographic survey it undertook with Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC) in relation to the Scarborough Gas Project.
 - b. By an attached document entitled "Attachment A", emailed on 17 March 2023, Woodside advised Ms Alec and Ms Cooper:

- i. of the existence of an ethnographic survey it undertook with MAC which concluded no cultural heritage would be affected. Ms Alec and Ms Cooper have explained that they have knowledge of sites and songlines that would not have been included in that ethnographic survey¹⁰;
- ii. that Woodside has "made several attempts since November 2021 to engage with Save Our Songlines, Josie Alec and Raelene Cooper" and that Woodside is "open to receiving feedback on the Seismic EP";
- iii. to refer to the information sheet that has been available on Woodside's website since May 2021 "inviting... request for additional information," and to version 0 of the environment plan available on the NOPSEMA website since 18 October 2021;
- iv. that Woodside has "resourced Traditional Custodian representative institutions to access relevant information and independent expert advice so that they are enabled to provide informed and considered feedback on the broader Scarborough activities". Ms Alec and Ms Cooper have not been so resourced, and have explained to Woodside that their functions, interests, activities and cultural knowledge is different to that of others with whom Woodside may have consulted;
- v. of a link to the Scarborough Cultural Heritage Management Plan,¹¹ which does not refer to the Seismic EP Activities;
- vi. in various conclusory statements that there would no impact on rock art or sites of cultural and spiritual significance; and that indirect impacts and risks raised by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper were not considered by Woodside to be impacts and risks of the Seismic EP Activities.
- 17. Woodside has not otherwise provided the documents, studies and other information requested by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper in the 6 June 2022 Letter and 22 November 2022 Letter.
- 18. Though NOPSEMA acknowledges that information "may well need to be provided in an iterative manner, as finer detail and precision is developed through the consultation process", ¹² Attachment A does not appear to contain the studies, surveys and documents that Ms Alec and Ms Cooper have requested. Our clients are not yet in a position to properly understand the impacts that the Seismic EP Activities might have on their functions, interests and activities; let alone to have been given the opportunity to participate in the kind of iterative process that would facilitate a genuine two-way dialogue between the titleholder and relevant persons. ¹³

- 19. The Attachment A document makes some references to sections of the Seismic Survey EP that have apparently been updated to address the impacts and risks of the Seismic EP Activities on our clients' functions, interests and activities. Attachment A does not provide any detail about the nature of these changes. As our clients only have access to the version of the Seismic Survey EP as first submitted to NOPSEMA on 11 October 2021, they do not have sufficient information to understand whether and how those changes mitigate impacts and risks on their functions, interests and activities.
- 20. Our clients specifically reiterate their request for a copy of the current version of the Seismic Survey EP (which we understand to be the version submitted to NOPSEMA on or around 23 March 2023). This document will assist our clients to understand the impacts and risks of the Seismic EP Activities as currently proposed by Woodside. It is difficult for our clients to understand why Woodside has not provided a copy of this document to them, noting in particular that it is a finalised document submitted to NOPSEMA and is not a "working" document that may be subject to immediate changes.

III. Woodside Has Not Provided a Sufficient Period for Consultation

- 21. Titleholders must be genuine,¹⁴ in that they must provide a "reasonable period" for the relevant person to make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of the proposed activity on their functions, interests or activities and so they are able to respond with any concerns.¹⁵
- 22. What is a reasonable period for consultation should be considered on a case-by-case basis. ¹⁶ Although Ms Alec and Ms Cooper consider their cultural obligations fundamentally important, they are individual persons who do not undertake consultation as part of their paid employment. They also have work, family and other cultural obligations that they must balance against the cultural obligation they have to be informed how the Seismic EP Activities will affect their interests and activities, and to engage in the consultation process to ensure that Woodside understand and address the environmental impacts and risks of its activities, including the Seismic EP Activities. Additionally, during the period in which Ms Alec and Ms Cooper were seeking to arrange an inperson meeting with Woodside, Ms Alec experienced illness requiring hospitalisation.
- 23. Here, although it has been approximately eight months since Ms Alec and Ms Cooper first requested information from Woodside that is necessary for them to properly understand the impacts of Woodside's activities, including the Seismic EP Activities, Woodside submitted the Seismic Survey EP:
 - a. just 10 days after first meeting with Ms Alec and Ms Cooper; and
 - b. just six days after first responding to Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's requests for information as those requests relate to the Seismic Survey EP with Attachment A;

- c. without inviting a response from Ms Alec and Ms Cooper or confirmation of whether the response was sufficient;
- d. without providing notice that Woodside intended to imminently submit a revised version of the Seismic Survey EP to NOPSEMA for assessment; and
- e. before receiving any response from Ms Alec and Ms Cooper.
- 24. That six-day window between receiving Attachment A and the Seismic Survey EP being resubmitted was not sufficient for Ms Alec and Ms Cooper to consider, based on the information provided, the effect of the proposed activity on their functions, interests and activities, or respond to Woodside with their concerns.
- 25. One week after receiving Attachment A, we advised Woodside that Ms Alec and Ms Cooper anticipate needing approximately six weeks to review and digest the information in Attachment A and arrange the next step in consultation. This period reflects our clients' respective availabilities (having regard to the matters outlined above at [22]) and the relative volume and complexity of information.

IV. Consultation Cannot Have Informed Mitigation of the Environmental Risks and Impacts

- 26. The consultation process is designed to ensure that the titleholder adopts appropriate measures in response to the concerns conveyed to the proponent by relevant persons.¹⁷ Ms Alec and Ms Cooper are of the view that consultation with them may present many opportunities to mitigate the impacts of the Seismic EP Activities.
- 27. Superficial or token consultation will not be enough and all group members should be afforded a reasonable opportunity to participate in decision-making. ¹⁸ The consultation process should produce more detail and precision which will inform titleholders' mitigation of the environmental risks and impacts. ¹⁹
- 28. It appears that this had not yet occurred with respect to the Seismic EP Activities. Attachment A appears to limit consideration of cultural features of the environment that may be affected to the Murujuga National Heritage Place and the "anticipated boundary of the Murujuga Cultural Landscape World Heritage Property". Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's cultural functions, interests and activities are not limited to that confined geographic area. By way of example, we note that in the Woodside Meeting, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper referred to cultural responsibilities and interests with respect to whales and songlines which extend into the ocean.
- 29. Woodside must ensure that they understand the nature of these interests, so that they may consider and respond to this information (including by informing NOPSEMA of the measures it has adopted or proposes to adopt to meet the concerns raised by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper) in order to

meet the criteria for acceptance of the EP.²⁰ Consultation will provide more detail and precision, which will enable Woodside in turn to address what measures need to be taken to mitigate environmental risks and impacts; which measures (and corresponding levels of impacts and risks) should be presented to NOPSEMA for its consideration in further decision-making.²¹

- 30. Given the Seismic Survey EP was resubmitted to NOPSEMA just 10 days after first meeting with Ms Alec and Ms Cooper; and just six days after Ms Alec and Ms Cooper were provided with a response to their previous requests for information necessary for them to consider how the Seismic EP Activities might affect their interests and activities, and before they had a chance to respond, it is not reasonable to conclude that Woodside refined or changed the measures it proposes, or adopted new measures, to address the impacts and risks of the Seismic EP Activities in light of the information it has received.
- 31. Our clients have not been provided with information or materials from Woodside that explains Woodside's understanding of our clients' functions, interests and activities, and therefore cannot confirm whether Woodside has understood and given proper consideration to relevant impacts, risks and mitigation measures. Woodside's email of 29 March 2023 indicated that Woodside is interested in learning about, relevantly, Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's interests.
- 32. A full and meaningful consultation process, which has not yet occurred, is necessary to ensure that Woodside is properly apprised of the environmental risks and impacts of the Seismic EP Activities, and that measures that might address those impacts and risks are considered and adopted.

V. Action required

33. In order to accept an environment plan, NOPSEMA must be reasonably satisfied that the environment plan demonstrates the obligation to carry out consultation with relevant persons required by reg 11A has been discharged and that the measures (if any) that the titleholder has adopted, or proposes to adopt, because of the consultations are appropriate. The obligation to consult must be discharged before an environment plan is submitted.²²

34. Because the proponent:

- a. Has not provided sufficient information to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper;
- b. Has not provided a reasonable period for consultation with Ms Alec and Ms Cooper; and
- c. Therefore cannot reasonably be understood to have refined or changed the measures it proposes to address the environmental impacts and risks of the Seismic EP Activities;

the Seismic Survey EP do not satisfy reg 10A(g), and our clients therefore urge NOPSEMA not to accept the Seismic Survey EP.

- 35. Instead, our clients request that you notify Woodside pursuant to reg 10(1) and (2) that you are not reasonably satisfied that the Seismic Survey EP meets the criteria in reg 10A.
- 36. Please do not hesitate to contact us should you wish to discuss. We look forward to hearing from you as a matter of urgency, in any in event, by no later than 5pm on 20 April 2023.

RE: Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan

We refer to the letter from the Environmental Defenders Office (**EDO**) dated 6 April 2023 that was addressed to you and was copied to Woodside (**Letter**). The subject of the Letter is "*Relevant interested person" consultation requirements – Scarborough Trunkline Installation 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan* (sic).

The Letter suggests that consultation with the EDO's clients Josie Alec (**Ms Alec**), Raelene Cooper (**Ms Cooper**) and Save Our Songlines (**SOS**) has not been completed and therefore Woodside's Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (**EP**) should not be accepted.

The notes set out below provide additional context in relation to items raised in the Letter, including in relation to Woodside's repeated and protracted attempts to meet, engage and consult with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS on the Scarborough Project, including the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (**EP**).

Woodside confirms the EP was submitted for approval on the grounds it meets the **Regulations** and intent for the documented environmental outcomes and commitments.

The underpinning consultation effort is documented within the EP, demonstrating the provision of sufficient information, sufficient time and opportunity to consult over an extended period.

The EP demonstrates that comprehensive studies have been relied on and extensive consultation has taken place, including an ethnographic survey which enhances Woodside's understanding of the environment, formed over decades of operating in the North Western area of Western Australia.

As to Woodside's consultation approach, you will see that consultation feedback and input is welcomed and received across the life of the EP, including while it is being prepared, while it is under assessment as well as after approval. The approach is extensive and, for example, includes consultation with parties pursuing public campaigns in opposition to the Scarborough Project and information gained through consultation is incorporated, if relevant and where it requires additional measures for managing risks and impacts of the specific activities of the EP.

Woodside continues to act in good faith and has consistently offered an open invitation to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS to provide feedback to allow Woodside to consider the potential impacts and risks of the activities on functions, interests and activities and to provide input on things Woodside can do to mitigate those potential impacts and risks.

The process for consultation remains open post EP approval, and any further feedback received, will be assessed and, where appropriate, Woodside will apply its Management of Change and revision process and update the EP as required. The attempts by parties to use the consultation mechanism to stall and delay approvals are not consistent with the intentions under the Regulations for consultation in good faith, however, are consistent with the consultation record (refer **Attachment A**).

We would be pleased to meet with you to discuss the notes contained in this letter and the issues raised in the Letter from EDO.

1. Context for consideration

The Letter refers to the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Regulations 2009* (Cth) (**Regulations**) and in particular to criteria for acceptance of an environment plan - regulation 10A(g) and 11A(1)(d):

Reg 10A(g) - For regulation 10, the criteria for acceptance of an environment plan are that the plan: ... (g) demonstrates that: (i) a titleholder has carried out the consultations required by Division 2.2A; and (ii) the measures (if any) that the titleholder has adopted, or proposes to adopt, because of the consultations are appropriate.

Division 2.2A, Reg 11A (1)(d) – In the course of preparing an environment plan... a titleholder must consult each of the following (a relevant person): (d) a person or organisation whose functions, interests and activities may be affected by the activities to be carried out under the environment plan...

We also note Regulation 14(9) which contemplates ongoing appropriate consultation being part of the implementation strategy for the Activity.

The Letter also refers to various excerpts from the Full Federal Court decision in *Santos NA Barossa Pty Ltd v Tipakalippa* [2022] FCAFC 193 (**Tipakalippa Decision**). The additional excerpts below provide further relevant comments for a decision-maker when reviewing consultation undertaken in relation to an Environment Plan:

- It must be taken to be the regulatory intention that the consultation requirement cannot be one that is incapable of being complied with within a reasonable time ... (par 136)
- The scheme ... operates on the premise that a titleholder will be able, with "reasonable diligence", to ... discharge its obligation to consult (par 138)
- [The consultation obligation is] an obligation that must be capable of practicable and reasonable discharge by the person upon whom it is imposed (par 89)
- It is recognised that a statutory obligation to consult must be understood in a practicable and reasonable way so that it is capable of performance (par 95)

It is also significant that in the Tipakalippa Decision, while it was acknowledged that consultation must be undertaken, the Court did not go as far as requiring a titleholder to reach agreement or obtain consent during consultation.

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2. Summary of consultation [paragraphs 5, 20, 21, 26-29]

Please see attached "**Attachment A**" which sets out Woodside's engagements with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS.

Woodside's position is that having regard to all of the circumstances of the consultation undertaken with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS, and in light of the concepts of "reasonable time", "reasonable diligence", a consultation obligation that "must be capable of practical and reasonable discharge ... that must be capable of performance" NOPSEMA can be reasonably satisfied that an appropriate level of consultation has taken place with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS.

As detailed below, the following are relevant:

- a) The SOS group was established in November 2021. Consultation involving Woodside and Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS has been ongoing since at least 15 December 2021, and, as recently as 29 March 2023, Woodside has reiterated that it remains open to engaging in further consultation
 - There have been numerous exchanges of correspondence, efforts to meet, scheduled meetings that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS did not attend (despite indicating they would), and a meeting that took place on 14 March 2023 at Hearson Cove in Karratha. Woodside has provided ample opportunities to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS to continue consultation and numerous offers to meet.
- b) An example of a consultation period of 21 30 days with traditional owners is set out in the Department of Mines and Petroleum "Guidelines for Consultation with Indigenous People by Mineral Explorers". Consultation under Regulation 11B of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations* 2009 (Cth) sets out a public consultation period of 30 days. In the context of those kinds of consultation periods, the period already undertaken for consultation is, objectively, an extended and sufficient period of time.
- c) Information has been provided that describes in detail, the activity proposed to be undertaken in the EP, the location, the duration, the risks, impacts and controls in place to minimise impacts and risks to as low as reasonably practicable.
- d) Our face-to-face consultations are prepared and developed on the basis of the extensive information contained in the EPs, fact sheets, and summaries, all of which have been provided to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS to enable them to assess potential risks and impacts to functions, interests and activities. The information has not materially changed over the various submissions of the EP and provides material to understand potential risks and impacts to functions, interests and activities.
- e) Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS have shown a high level of awareness and understanding of the Scarborough Project and have noted to Woodside, various avenues available to access further information.
- f) Ms Alec and Ms Cooper note that there is information that is not yet known to them (for instance, wisdom that Murujuga rocks have for the past and future) and that the information be revealed to them in time. Ms Alec and Ms Cooper indicated that they will share the information when that information is revealed to them. In addition, Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS have indicated they have other information that they are not ready to share but will share at the appropriate time.

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- g) Woodside has confirmed that when new information is shared, Woodside will consider it and, if relevant and appropriate, has a process for updating the EP and including additional controls as required.
- h) Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS have been asked directly to indicate how Woodside can carry out activities in a way that is sensitive to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS's cultural knowledge and have been told that there is no way to do this other than stopping the Scarborough Project.
- In any event, Woodside remains patient and open to receiving information and continuing the consultation with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS that has been ongoing since at least December 2021.

3. Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan [paragraph 2, 26]

The EP was resubmitted to NOPSEMA for assessment on 19 March 2023. A full version of the EP is available on the NOPSEMA website.

The EP sets out (amongst other things) a description of the seismic activities in Commonwealth waters (Activities) and:

- location where the Activities will occur
- duration of the Activities
- assessed impacts and risks of the Activities
- controls (environmental performance objectives and environmental performance standards and measurement criteria) to manage impacts and risks of the Activities to as low as reasonably practicable (ALARP) and an acceptable level.

It is worth noting that a previous EP which included the seismic activity proposed to be undertaken the current EP was submitted in June 2019 and accepted by NOPSEMA in December 2019. The activity was unable to be commenced because of COVID.

The current EP covers the same seismic activity (although it is limited to the Scarborough area) and was submitted in October 2021.

For the current EP, the Activity description, location, duration, risks and impacts and controls have substantially remained the same through the various re-submissions of the EP that have occurred since October 2021. During the re-submission process, the EP Activity description has, however reduced – for example, the Activity no longer proposes to include use of autonomous ocean bottom seismic nodes.

We emphasise these parts of the EP because they set out the information about the Activity proposed to be carried out under the EP that is useful for relevant persons to understand the potential risks and impacts of the Activities relevant to them.

4. Correspondence, consultation and other information [paragraph 3; 4; 7; 9; 13-25]

<u>4.A Previous correspondence</u> and consultation

The Letter from the EDO confirms there has been a history of correspondence and consultation between Ms Alec, Ms Cooper, SOS and Woodside.

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So there is visibility, we note in addition to those referred to in the EDO Letter, numerous other pieces of correspondence, interfaces and consultation have been undertaken. Please see **Attachment A**.

4.B Additional information

In addition to the notes above, Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS have posted and provided views, summaries and comments on the Scarborough Project in a number of different forums. These include:

- a) **Save Our Songlines website** which contains views on the Scarborough Project, summaries of the Scarborough Project, YouTube videos as well as links to other websites which also express opinions on the Scarborough Project (Save Our Songlines Protect the Burrup)
- b) **27 November 2021** Community rally in Karratha to oppose the Scarborough Project which included Ms Alec and Ms Cooper who spoke, amongst other things, about the Scarborough Project (Reference: Fears Woodside's Scarborough gas project threatens rock art, Pilbara environment ABC News)
- c) February, September and October 2022 Ms Alec and Ms Cooper requests for assessment under Aboriginal Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984 (Cth) which includes notes on the Scarborough Project (Reference: Notice of an application for the protection of a specified area, being parts of the area known as Murujuga (or the Burrup Peninsula and Dampier Archipelago), Western Australia (legislation.gov.au))
- d) **7 July 2022** Attendance at the United Nations by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper which included comments on the Scarborough Project (<u>United Nations fronted by Traditional Owners fighting to save Country | SBS NITV</u>) (See Attachment B Media Release).

Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS have held or have current roles that are also relevant:

- a) Ms Cooper confirmed in the 14 March 2023 meeting that she was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Ms Cooper resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Ms Cooper (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back an extended period to when discussions on the Scarborough Project commenced with the MAC in June 2018.
- b) We understand that Ms Cooper may have known of the ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project that were undertaken by MAC during the period that Ms Cooper was a Board member of MAC. While Woodside has no authority to provide the survey to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS, Ms Cooper may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.
- c) At the meeting Ms Alec confirmed she has been appointed the "First Nations Lead" at Australian Conservation Foundation. (ACF has publicly confirmed that it has commenced Federal Court proceedings against Woodside, challenging the Scarborough Project approvals).

4.C Consequence of correspondence and consultation

The various pieces of correspondence and consultation confirm that:

- a) Issues that have regularly been identified by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS primarily relate to:
 - o air emission impacts on rock art
 - o displacement or removal of rock art
 - o greenhouse gas emissions
 - lack of access to cultural sites

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- o specific cultural concerns
- b) These issues have been addressed by Woodside in the various pieces of correspondence and consultation with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS.
- c) Woodside has made numerous offers to meet with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS. This included (as identified above) a meeting that was planned in Karratha for October 2022 and that Woodside prepared to attend (including by flying a specialist environment employee to join the Woodside meeting contingent to Karratha), which Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS did not end up attending.
- d) Woodside has consistently noted it is open to receiving feedback and to continue engaging in consultation. This was reiterated as recently as on 29 March 2023.
- e) Woodside has sought general and specific information from Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS and demonstrated it is open to receiving information.
- f) Some specific questions were asked at the meeting on 14 March 2023 and were set out in emails, most recently an email dated 29 March 2023 from Woodside to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS:
 - A question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting.
 - Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.
 - O Woodside also asked along the lines what it could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.
 - A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.
 - These answers informed our team's take aways from the meeting. Following the meeting, our team considered what was discussed in the meeting including references to whales and potential songlines. Based on the information exchanged at the meeting, no updates were required to the EP prior to resubmission.
 - The Woodside team who attended the 14 March 2023 meeting confirmed that no specific information was provided by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper or SOS in relation to impacts to whales or songlines. For visibility, in the EP Woodside recognises that whales and other species of totemic importance need to be protected, including their populations and migration patterns. The EP assess this and a suite of controls are in place to manage it.
- g) Requests from Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS relating to the meetings have changed over time and Woodside has responded flexibly to those changes.
- h) Woodside has provided information on the Activity, duration, location, risks, impacts, controls to enable Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS to consider impacts and risks of the activities.
- i) In addition to the issues and topics that continue to be referenced by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS, at the meeting and in correspondence, Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS have indicated that they have information that is relevant but that they are not yet ready to share with Woodside.

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- Woodside has consistently confirmed that it remains open to hearing from Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS when the information is known and it is ready to be shared.
- j) Woodside has agreed to continue to attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation and trust.
- k) Attendees to meetings have agreed to come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- 1) Throughout the correspondence and consultation, Woodside has confirmed that Woodside remains open to consulting further on the proposed Scarborough activities and that it is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.
- m) In addition, Woodside has confirmed that it has a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through the EP Management of Knowledge and Management of Change and Revision processes. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the impact and risks in accordance with the impact and risk analysis and evaluation methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks if not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP. This means that feedback or information provided in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

4.D Opportunity to input, feedback and consult

Despite Woodside's continued consultation effort and numerous invitations to meet, the correspondence received from Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS suggests that consultation has not yet occurred, or has only just commenced, or has not been fulsome enough.

From an objective perspective, there may be various reasons for a position along these lines, including:

- a) Lack of availability (work / travel commitments etc)
- b) Lack of understanding of the project
- c) Illness and hospitalisation
- d) A desire to use the consultation mechanism to stop or stall the Scarborough Project

We set these out because, in the circumstances of a) b) and c), it is reasonable to expect that a titleholder might assist with consultation by providing an extended period for consultation, various different options and opportunities to meet and various different formats that describe the project so that it is accessible (eg a publicly available summary of the EP, Fact Sheets as well as Plain English Fact Sheets and offers to explain the project at face-to-face meetings). Woodside has provided all of these to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS.

In circumstances of d), other than continuing to acknowledge peaceful protests, remaining patient, remaining open to receiving feedback throughout the life of an EP and having processes in place to

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update EPs when further relevant information is received, there is nothing further that a titleholder can reasonably do to progress or close out consultation.

In the current circumstances, there appears to be evidence of reticence to meet and to share information in circumstances where information and meetings have been encouraged by Woodside and there has been a demonstration that Woodside remains open to receiving feedback and information.

In all of the circumstances, Woodside remains patient and open to receiving feedback and consulting on its Activities with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS.

5. Interests of Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS [paragraphs 6; 7; 10-12; 20(b)]

Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS are described in the EDO Letter as "traditional owners with cultural responsibilities, interests in and connections to Murujuga, including surrounding sea country".

We confirm we have heard that Ms Alec's and Ms Cooper's functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC).

We want to be very clear that, in addition to consulting with MAC, we have been engaging with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS and have confirmed ongoing consultation.

6. Reasonable exercise of rights

Also noteworthy is that the "Demonstration of Acceptability" set out in the EP, refers to section 280 "Interference with other rights" of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act 2006* (Cth):

A titleholder ...carrying on activities in an offshore area ... must carry on those activities in a manner that does not interfere with ... (e) the enjoyment of native title rights and interests (within the meaning of the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth)) to a greater extent than is necessary for the reasonable exercises of the rights and performance of the duties of the titleholder.

For the Activity in this EP, there is no native title claim, determination or ILUA over the Commonwealth waters (Operational Area or EMBA) and therefore also no native title rights or interests (as recognised under the native title legislation) identified for the area where the Activity will take place or in the EMBA.

The assessment of consultation undertaken for the EP should be considered in that context – that is, in the context of relevant persons where there is no native title rights granted under legislation. This should be contrasted with the overriding right of a titleholder to interfere, albeit not to a greater extent than is necessary for the reasonable exercise of rights and performance of duties.

7. Relevant persons [paragraph 8]

Woodside reiterates that the issue of relevant person has been responded to in correspondence and was sensitively discussed at the Meeting. (Please see the notes from our email of 29 March 2023.)

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8. Next steps

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Summary

Since June 2018, Woodside has undertaken 82 substantial engagements relating to the Scarborough Project, including 32 meetings with Traditional Custodians and their representative institutions.

The Scarborough Project engagements have included discussion of the following EPs:

- Scarborough Trunkline Installation (State Waters) EP
- Scarborough 4D Baseline Marine Seismic Survey EP
- WA-61-L and WA 62-L Subsea Infrastructure Installation EP
- Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline EP
- Scarborough Drilling and Completions EP

Meetings have mostly been face-to-face and have also included on-line options for providing feedback, particularly during periods of COVID-19 risk.

Following initial notification to authorised representative institutions about the Scarborough Project in around mid-2018, Woodside has continued to extend consultation periods to adapt and manage COVID concerns, and to avoid cultural Law and Sorry Business periods.

Woodside's engagements and consultations with Traditional Owner groups pre-date the creation of the Save Our Songlines interest group. Save the Burrup – Save our Songlines was created on 19 November 2021. The group described its purpose as: songlines, saving our world and saying no to Woodside's Scarborough gas. When it formed, it did not represent itself as a Traditional Owner society.

Woodside's specific engagements with SOS are set out below. The information below includes separate activity breakdowns (ie. It does not include duplicate or follow up attempts to engage) as follows:

- > 5 meetings
- 2 attempted meetings
- > 19 emails
- > 7 phone calls
- > 10 letters

Traditional custodians address United Nations on damage to priceless rock art by Woodside's WA Scarborough gas project

Save Our Songlines

Traditional custodians address UN on damage to priceless rock art by Woodside's WA Scarborough gas project

Traditional custodians from Murujuga are speaking at the United Nations in Geneva, Switzerland this week to address concerns about their cultural heritage and sacred rock art in the face of industrial threats from Woodside's Scarborough gas and related projects on Western Australia's Burrup

Raelene Cooper and Josie Alec will address the United Nations Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. They are traditional custodians of Murujuga, also known as the Burrup Peninsula, the site of the oldest, largest collection of Aboriginal rock art in the world. Murujuga is nominated for UNESCO world heritage listing but it is also the site of Australia's largest fossil fuel project, Woodside Energy's Burrup Hub, the latest addition to which is the massive Scarborough gas project.

Murujuga is a deeply sacred place and priceless cultural treasure but the sacred songlines and stories contained in its carvings are being damaged by emissions from the Burrup Hub and face total destruction within decades.

Traditional custodians have voiced their opposition to further development on Murujuga but have been silenced by 'gag clauses' in industrial agreements with the WA government.

Ms Cooper and Ms Alec launched their <u>Save Our Songlines</u> campaign last year to share the concerns of First Nations custodians about the threat posed by the fossil fuel industry to their sacred Murujuga rock art. Murujuga elders and custodians have previously shared their cultural heritage concerns and made several emergency applications and requests for further consultation from government and industry.

Despite <u>engaging with the Federal government</u> previously <u>presenting their concerns to WA</u>

<u>Parliament</u>, traditional custodians are still silenced and ignored by the Australian government and by

industry. By speaking this week at the United Nations Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples in Geneva, Ms Alec and Ms Cooper will share the stories of this sacred landscape with a global audience and ensure that the whole world is aware of what is at stake in this critical clash between culture and industry.

Raelene Cooper is a Mardudhunera woman with obligations, responsibilities and spiritual connection to Murujuga and former Chairperson of the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC), before she resigned from the MAC board earlier this year over concerns about constraints and co-option by industry and a lack of consultation or consent of traditional custodians.

Addressing the UN Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples on Tuesday, Ms Cooper said:

"Coming from a tradition of spiritual healing, we increasingly feel the urgent need to defend our ancient history, our stories and our culture. We hold a spiritual connection and continue to comply with our Cultural Protocols and Governance. Our traditions continue and are practised still today. The *ngurra*, our land, is our temple and our parliament. The rock art archives our lore. It is written not on a tablet of stone, but carved into the ngurra, which holds our Dreaming stories and Songlines.

The Australian Senate Inquiry into the 45,000 year old Juukan Gorge disaster strongly recommended the removal of gag clauses in all industrial agreements with First Nations people. And yet, on Murujuga we are still silenced by gag clauses in the 2003 original agreement with the state government that determines land use on our sacred ngurra.

We are here to pass down knowledge for a better understanding of First Nations history, and for the protection of mother earth and all her people. I make the recommendation that the free, prior and informed consent of First Nations custodians be guaranteed through active consultation about any new industry on our Country."

Josie Alec is a Kuruma Marduthunera woman with cultural, business and spiritual obligations and connections on Murujuga, a keeper of the Seven Sisters Dreaming story on Murujuga and is a singer and traditional healer who uses medicine she collects on Murujuga as part of her healing work.

Addressing the UN Expert Mechanism on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples on Wednesday, Ms Alec said:

"I am a Keeper of the Seven Sisters Dreaming story on our lands at Murujuga, The Burrup Peninsula in the Pilbara, Western Australia. We are the custodians of the star, earth and water lore. With this comes an obligation to protect, practice, preserve and respect its ancient history.

My intention, today, is to bring awareness of the destruction and desecration that industry has already, and is intending to, inflict on Murujuga and the sacred rock art. I use the word "inflict" as it best describes the way I feel about the impact of industry on the area - it is an attack on our culture, the plants, animals, water and air of Ngurra (Mother Earth).

In my culture women and men have separate responsibilities, knowledge and cultural practices around sacred sites, to the extent women and men do not even know the details of each others stories. Female participation in the heritage surveying and approval processes, is vital to ensure the women's cultural sites are identified and recorded prior to approvals being considered. This has not happened at Murujuga (and other sacred sites in Australia) and resulted in approvals for massive industrial projects over significant women's sacred sites.

The principle of Free, Prior and Informed Consent in the UN Declaration is not being upheld - not on the Burrup and not anywhere in Western Australia. This is despite Woodside claiming that it is 'guided by the UN Declaration' in their own policy. As our cultural heritage safety is a fundamental human right. I would like to make a recommendation that the United Nations, under the Rights of *Indigenous* Peoples, hold the governments of Australia and corporations to account, to move forward on The World Heritage listing so we can protect this globally significant cultural site for current and future generations."

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation,

with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

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As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

• Attendees continue to be all female.

- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and
 cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the
 meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen
 or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

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As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;

- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the take-aways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

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In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing*. *The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

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The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

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Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

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On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas
 Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (**Seismic Survey EP**).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate

level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill — we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

• Attendees continue to be all female.

- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of
 places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed
 Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is
 currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on
 the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

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We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

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it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

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On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document. As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- Attendees continue to be all female.
- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information

and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: all that can be done is for the project to be stopped.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing*. The only option is to stop the project.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- Attendees continue to be all female.
- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and
 cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the
 meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen
 or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of

Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of

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the take-aways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: all that can be done is for the project to be stopped.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing*. *The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

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Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

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The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

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We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment)*Regulations 2009 (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- Attendees continue to be all female.
- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and
 cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the
 meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or
 avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

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We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in

a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values.* The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project.*

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. Ongoing consultation and next meeting

Woodside once again reiterates it is open and willing to engage in ongoing consultation with you on the Seismic Survey EP as well as the following Scarborough Commonwealth EPs which have been referenced during consultation and our meeting in March:

- Scarborough 4D Baseline Marine Seismic Survey EP
- WA-61-L and WA 62-L Subsea Infrastructure Installation EP
- Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline EP
- Scarborough Drilling and Completions EP

As per our email below from 28 March, our team is available to meet in May and we are still waiting to hear from you about your availability for a meeting. Please let us know when suits you to meet in the weeks commencing 15 May, 22 May and 29 May.

We are available to meet on country or, as you note below, by video conference or telephone (as appropriate).

Our team is willing to observe the same protocols that we agreed to prior to our March 2023 meeting. We remain respectful of cultural sensitivities and also employee safety and privacy and including for those reasons, do not consent to the meeting being recorded.

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- Attendees continue to be all female.
- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

• Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: all that can be done is for the project to be stopped.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values.* The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project.*

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

Thanks for our meeting on Tuesday (14 March 2023).

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 Woodside Energy.
- Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (**Seismic Survey EP**).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an
 informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions,
 interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that

response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your

and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill — we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- Attendees continue to be all female.
- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of
 places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed
 Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is
 currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on
 the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those

discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the take-aways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there

was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing*. *The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from

consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document. As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons. As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.


We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:



Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

• Attendees continue to be all female.

- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and
 cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the
 meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or
 avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

• the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation 165

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. As the EDO's email was copied to email addresses for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA, we have, as a matter of courtesy copied the same email address.

Ongoing consultation and next meeting

Woodside once again reiterates it is open and willing to engage in ongoing consultation with you on the Seismic Survey EP as well as the following Scarborough Commonwealth EPs which have been referenced during consultation and our meeting in March:

- Scarborough 4D Baseline Marine Seismic Survey EP
- WA-61-L and WA 62-L Subsea Infrastructure Installation EP
- Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline EP
- Scarborough Drilling and Completions EP

As per our email below from 28 March, our team is available to meet in May and we are still waiting to hear from you about your availability for a meeting. Please let us know when suits you to meet in the weeks commencing 15 May, 22 May and 29 May.

We are available to meet on country or, as you note below, by video conference or telephone (as appropriate).

Our team is willing to observe the same protocols that we agreed to prior to our March 2023 meeting. We remain respectful of cultural sensitivities and also employee safety and privacy and including for those reasons, do not consent to the meeting being recorded.

Agenda for meeting

As to your specific interests (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us to allow Woodside to consider the potential impacts and risks of the EP activities on these interests and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In previous correspondence and meetings, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

- overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;
- explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so the Woodside

may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

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A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

- Attendees continue to be all female.
- Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.
- Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and
 cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the
 meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or
 avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.
- Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).
- Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

- the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;
- individual interests you each have;
- the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;
- the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;
- the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values.* The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project.*

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies (his

category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.


We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 Woodside Energy.
 - Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.
 - Confirm fracking in relation to the Scarborough activities: There is no fracking to be undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.

We want you to know that, as discussed, we are open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and are open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities. Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

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Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

individual interests you each have;

the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;

the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;

the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the diages that no

credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 Woodside Energy.
 - Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.
 - Confirm fracking in relation to the Scarborough activities: There is no fracking to be undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.



Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (**Seismic Survey EP**).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas

Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill — we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential

new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

individual interests you each have;

the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;

the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;

the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the take-aways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing*. *The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the

industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document. As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.


Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in

Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's
 Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring
 Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website:
 Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 Woodside Energy.
 - Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: *The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.*
 - Confirm fracking in relation to the Scarborough activities: There is no fracking to be undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.

We want you to know that, as discussed, we are open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and are open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities. Please let us know if further feedback for the activities proposed under the environment plans is sensitive and we will make this known to NOPSEMA upon submission to ensure this information remains confidential to NOPSEMA.

In the meantime, we are grateful to have met you and to have heard your perspectives on the Scarborough activities and Woodside.





Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, ppg can ensure

that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was

good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

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We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

- Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 Woodside Energy.

Ongoing consultation and next meeting

Woodside once again reiterates it is open and willing to engage in ongoing consultation with you on the Seismic Survey EP as well as the following Scarborough Commonwealth EPs which have been referenced during consultation and our meeting in March:

Scarborough 4D Baseline Marine Seismic Survey EP

WA-61-L and WA 62-L Subsea Infrastructure Installation EP

Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline EP

Scarborough Drilling and Completions EP

As per our email below from 28 March, our team is available to meet in May and we are still waiting to hear from you about your availability for a meeting. Please let us know when suits you to meet in the weeks commencing 15 May, 22 May and 29 May.

We are available to meet on country or, as you note below, by video conference or telephone (as appropriate).

Our team is willing to observe the same protocols that we agreed to prior to our March 2023 meeting. We remain respectful of cultural sensitivities and also employee safety and privacy and including for those reasons, do not consent to the meeting being recorded.

Agenda for meeting

As to your specific interests (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us to allow Woodside to consider the potential impacts and risks of the EP activities on these interests and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's

consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

individual interests you each have;

the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;

the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;

the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the take-aways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

<u>Underwater activities</u>

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a

discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from

consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document. As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons. As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

Thanks for our meeting on Tuesday (14 March 2023).

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.



Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Thanks for your email and letter dated 24 March 2023.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

individual interests you each have;

the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;

the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;

the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:



I note that I have tried to call you several times this morning, and also with the messages I have left, or our emails. Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with our clients to explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

Additional or new information

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

individual interests you each have;

the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold:

the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;

the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values*. The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project*.

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

• Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 - Woodside Energy.

Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.

Confirm fracking in relation to the Scarborough activities: *There is no fracking to be undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.*





Thank you for your email of 29 March 2023 in respect of the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic Survey EP).

Thank you for acknowledging our clients' continued efforts to bring themselves into Woodside's consultation processes and to organise a face-to-face meeting on Country. Our clients confirm their willingness to meet again and to continue consultation. To be clear, our clients do not consider there has yet been consultation such that Woodside can demonstrate in the EP that there has been an appropriate level of consultation. This will require further information to be shared and incorporated into the EP. Our clients are also concerned that because their cultural knowledge is women's knowledge, it is being considered less important than other cultural knowledge Woodside may have received during consultation.

Our clients look forward to providing information about their interests that Woodside needs.

Having had an introductory meeting on 14 March 2023, and mindful that the EP appears to have been re-submitted around nine days after that introductory meeting took place, we propose that Woodside withdraw the EP and meet with payr clients to

explain to them the relevant risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP specifically, and to obtain further information on their functions, interests and activities. We note in particular that the introductory meeting of 14 March 2023 did not discuss the activities the subject of Seismic Survey EP in any detail.

Our clients are generally available to meet by phone or videoconference in May.

In addition to abiding by the cultural protocol summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose the following purposes for the meeting:

overview of any outstanding requests for information made by our clients;

explanation of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, so that our clients can make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests and activities.

Mindful that Woodside is required under reg 16(b) of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009* (Cth) to provide NOPSEMA with a full report on all consultation with relevant persons, and the difficulties in different perspectives that have been encountered as described in your email of 29 March 2023, our clients propose that this next meeting be recorded, and that permission be sought should Woodside wish to provide transcripts, recordings or other documents referring to cultural knowledge to NOPSEMA.

Our clients otherwise request that the cultural protocols requested in advance of the 14 March 2023 meeting, and summarised in your email of 29 March 2023, be continued.

Following a meeting for Woodside to explain the risks and impacts of the Seismic Survey EP, we propose that our clients be given appropriate time to consider and respond to information shared by Woodside at or after the meeting, so that Woodside may be apprised of all the environmental risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP, and can ensure that those impacts and risks are be reduced as low as reasonably practicable. To be clear as to our clients' needs, we expect the timeframe for that response to be approximately 4-6 weeks.

We anticipate that a decision as to whether the response from our clients be in writing, through a meeting, or some combination or other communication, is best determined in light of information Woodside provides, and the information our clients seek to provide in response. We anticipate that that response will also propose next steps for the consultation, with a view to enabling Woodside to adopt measures that will reduce the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP.

Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines asked, at our 14 March 2023 meeting that Woodside continue correspondence with them, via you. Hence our email and our respectful request that the following be communicated to Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines

We received the email and letter sent to us by the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) dated 24 March 2023. The letter sets out recollections and reflections on the meeting we had on country in Karratha on 14 March 2023 as well as comments on our email of 16 March 2023.

First, we wanted to thank you for sharing the recollections and reflections with us. Secondly, we thought it would be worth sharing our perspectives on comments in that letter – please see these below.

Just so you know, this email relates to the Scarborough Commonwealth EPs. The letter sent to us was copied to an email address for the Chief Executive Officer of NOPSEMA. So, for courtesy and so that you are aware, we are also providing a copy of this email to NOPSEMA. Acknowledging that we separately sent an email to you yesterday on the State Waters EPs that was copied to Minister Johnston and DMIRS.

Consultations, correspondence and meeting on 14 March 2023 [Paragraphs 1-5, 10, 13, 20]

The team at Woodside was pleased to have met face-to-face with you on 14 March 2023. It was the culmination of a long period of communication on the Scarborough Project involving a number of prior attempts to meet face-to-face (since around November 2021) and, since at least June 2022, an extensive exchange of correspondence specific to each of the Scarborough environment plans (EP) and activities set out in the letter (Seismic EP, Drilling EP, Subsea EP, SITI EP, State Waters EP). It was good to meet and we confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the Commonwealth EPs as well as the State Waters EP.

A great deal of information was shared at the 14 March 2023 meeting. This included a discussion of your and Save Our Songlines' cultural details and was provided against the backdrop of the protocols we agreed before the meeting. The Woodside team left the 2-hour meeting feeling positive and with a sense of goodwill – we appreciated the exchange of warm mutual embraces at the opening and end of the meeting. We all expressed, at the end of the meeting, a willingness to meet again.

As per discussions leading up to the meeting, unless things change, for future meetings, we agree to continue with the following meeting protocols:

Attendees continue to be all female.

Attendees attend meetings with an open heart, deep listening and seeking a respectful conversation.

Attendees come to meetings open to sharing knowledge about the environment (heritage value of places, social and cultural features) that may be affected by the activities under the proposed Scarborough EPs. Attendees come to the meeting open to sharing ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Attendees are welcome to take written notes of meetings. To respect privacy, safety and cultural values there will be no other recording of meetings (e.g. no audio or visual recording of meetings).

Other than sharing the fact that the meeting took place, the cultural details will be kept confidential amongst the female attendees unless directed otherwise and will not be made public without permission.

We also confirm that Woodside remains open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and is open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities.

So that you are aware, we have a process in place for the life of an EP that allows the EP to be updated to include additional or new information or feedback that is received after an EP is submitted. This is done through a "Management of Knowledge" process. So, for example, if new or additional information is provided to Woodside, Woodside can consider that information and assess the risk in accordance with the environmental risk management methodology in the EP to determine the significance of potential new environmental impacts or risks not already provided for in the EP. In that context, if information changes Woodside's understanding of the environment or understanding of measures that Woodside can take in order to lessen or avoid impacts of activities, that information can be updated and actioned in the EP.

This means that feedback or information you provide in future meetings can still be taken into account and, where appropriate, can be incorporated in the EP during the life of the activity.

Following the meeting, we considered what you told us. Based on that information, no updates were required to the EP via the Management of Knowledge process.

Functions, interests and activities [Paragraph 6, 13]

Thank you for confirming in the letter that you consider that your functions, interests and activities are distinct from those of MAC. We also heard you say this at our meeting. We are interested in learning further about your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines) and how those are different to MAC's.

The letter also references MAC surveys. As Raelene mentioned in the meeting, Raelene was, for around 10 years, a former Board member of MAC. (We understand Raelene resigned from the Board in around February 2022). So, Woodside's correspondence, involvement and meetings on the Scarborough Project with Raelene (in her capacity as a MAC representative) also go back a long time to when those discussions commenced with the MAC – in around 2018.

We understand that Raelene was involved in ethnographic studies of the Scarborough Project undertaken by MAC. So, while we have no authority to provide the survey to you, in response to your request for the ethnographic survey, Raelene may have contacts at MAC to request a copy of that survey.

As to your functions, interests and activities (and those of Save Our Songlines), we continue to invite you to share those with us as well to allow Woodside to consider the likely impacts and risks of the EP activities on these functions, interests and activities and what Woodside can do to lessen or avoid those impacts.

In our meeting, we heard you tell us that you were not prepared to share some information with us at this stage and you weren't sure when you would be ready to share it with us. And we also heard that, sometimes the information has not yet been revealed to you and that it will be revealed to you in time. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

In particular, we are interested in learning from you:

the role you perform within Save Our Songlines;

individual interests you each have;

the types of communal interests that each of you and Save Our Songlines hold;

the functions of Save Our Songlines as an organization;

the activities that each of you and Save Our Songlines engage in

To confirm - we don't expect you to provide this information to us in writing and would be happy to meet with you again to discuss this information as per our meeting protocols.

It is important that this information is provided so that Woodside can understand how the proposed activities (that are the subject of the Commonwealth EPs) may affect your functions, interests and activities. We remain open to hearing from you when this is known to you and it is ready to be shared.

Minimising impacts to your functions, interests and activities [Paragraphs 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14]

Thank you for notes in the letter on the meeting content.

A comment in the letter is that information had been mischaracterised in the email that we sent you following the meeting. We want to be very clear that our intention is not and was not to mischaracterise information. We want to be very clear that the information provided in our email following the meeting is our group's genuine recollection and interpretation of the takeaways from the meeting. That is, consistent with the agreed protocols for the meeting which included a request that you share ideas of things that Woodside is currently doing well and things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities on the environment.

Our team has reviewed notes taken at the meeting. Below we've set out our team's perspectives of some of the items noted in the letter.

Underwater activities

In the meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough Project. At that point in the meeting, a number of topics had been discussed (not repeated here so as to respect confidentiality). After the Scarborough Project was overviewed, at a high level (so as to respect confidentiality), there was a discussion about songlines and, in so far as underwater activities are concerned, there was a discussion about potential impacts of activities on whales.

During this discussion, a question was asked by Woodside along the lines of: what things can Woodside do in order to carry out the Scarborough Project in a respectful way to the knowledge and cultural information that has been shared in the meeting. Our team's recollection is that the answer given was along the lines of: there is nothing Woodside can do to carry out the project in a respectful way and that it was not clear why the project was happening in Murujuga and why it couldn't be done somewhere else along the coast.

We also asked what Woodside could do to protect the values that were being talked about. The answer that was given was along the lines of: *all that can be done is for the project to be stopped*.

A further question was asked along the lines of: *if the project is to go ahead what could be done to protect the values.* The answer given was along the lines of: *nothing. The only option is to stop the project.*

These answers informed our take aways from the meeting.

Greenhouse gas emissions

The topic of greenhouse gas was also raised. This topic has been the subject of separate correspondence in which Woodside has confirmed that, emissions from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs are of a scale that no credible impact pathway is foreseen.

Industrialisation of Murujuga

The topic of industrialisation of Murujuga was also raised. Out of respect for confidentiality, we will not repeat the information provided in the meeting in relation to signing of the Burrup and Maitland and Industrial Estates Agreement (BMIEA). However, the subject has also been addressed in separate correspondence in which Woodside has set out its understanding of the history of the Burrup and the industrial agreements involved. Woodside has also provided responses which are along the lines that no credible impact pathway is foreseen from the activities covered by the Commonwealth EPs which could damage rock art and heritage sites and that no cultural impact to future access to sites of cultural and spiritual significance is foreseen.

Detail of EPs and information accessed and provided

As set out above, the face-to-face meeting involved an overview of the Scarborough Project. The face-to-face meeting followed volumes of previous correspondence on the Scarborough Project. We acknowledge the many pieces of previous correspondence that have been sent to Woodside which have been specific to each of the EPs set out in the letter. That previous correspondence indicates that a large volume of information on the Scarborough Project has been accessed, read and thought through. The correspondence shows an informed and thorough understanding of the various Scarborough activities and the Scarborough Project.

Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage Act (OPGGS Act) – section 280 Interference with other rights [paragraph 13]

In the letter, section 280 of the OPGGS Act is noted. We do not understand why that particular aspect of the OPGGS Act has been referenced. We are open to hearing more from you on what you would like us to understand from the reference to section 280 of the OPGGS Act.

Consultation in general [paragraph 14]

The letter has a line that suggests that Woodside is implying that "nothing is to be gained from consulting" with you. We want to be very clear that these are not Woodside's words. Woodside has not put that position forward and is not making an implication of this kind.

On the contrary, we have continued to consult with you and continue to invite further consultation. We were pleased to have had the opportunity to finally meet with you face-to-face this month and we look forward to further meetings with you to learn of your and Save Our Songlines' interests.

Relevant persons [paragraph 4, 15-19]

The concept of "relevant person" was raised in the letter and also at our meeting. We heard in the meeting that you were insulted that Woodside had categorised SOS as relevant but had not recognised you under the heading of relevant person. You also told us that you were pleased to see that you and SOS have since been included as relevant interested persons in the State EP summary document.

As we discussed at the meeting, Woodside's intention is not to insult you. We reiterate this as we want to be very clear about this.

We also want you to know that the "relevant person" category is different depending on whether the EP requires Commonwealth approval or State approval (WA). For the Commonwealth EPs, the Commonwealth laws apply. The Commonwealth approval process requires Woodside to consult with "relevant persons".

At the meeting, we took you through the approval process relating to the concept of "relevant persons" and noted that, at the relevant time consultations are included under a category of "relevant persons" in EPs. Woodside generally applies this category at a stage when we understand more about a person's functions, interests and activities and also the impacts of our activities on them.

As noted in your letter and above, we also discussed at our meeting that Save Our Songlines, Josie and Raelene have been included under the category of "relevant interested persons" in the State Waters EP. You kindly acknowledged at our meeting that you understood the reasons for redactions that were made to the State EP summary to protect personal information.

These kind of considerations continue and we will have a clearer understanding of the categories when you are able to share more with us. But as we reiterated at the meeting, you should know that there is no need for us to categorise you as relevant in order to consult with you.

Ongoing consultation

Once an EP is accepted, Woodside continues ongoing consultations with relevant persons.

As confirmed in the meeting, and consistent with our processes for ongoing consultation, the important issue is that we are open to continuing consultation and that we are keen to keep talking to you to understand how the proposed Commonwealth EP activities relevantly affect you and Save Our Songlines. Once we understand the kind of functions, interests and activities you and Save Our Songlines hold, we can consider the things that Woodside can do to lessen or avoid impacts of the activities to you.

Responses to questions and further information [paragraph 21-27]

The letter notes some questions that were asked during our face-to-face meeting. As acknowledged in the letter, specific questions on the Scarborough Gas Project, the ethnographic survey and fracking have been actioned and there is nothing substantial to add to the answers provided in our email.

As to requests for further information and notifications, please remain subscribed to Woodside's and relevant regulators' website as a best source of information relating to updates to EP assessments.

Further consultation [paragraph 24-27]

The letter sent to us notes that you would like to organise another meeting and will require approximately six weeks to read into materials and prepare for a meeting.

We would be pleased to consult with you further. It took a number of attempts to book and arrange our March face-to-face meeting, so please let us know your preferred times for the next meeting.

If it would be useful, our team is available to meet in the week commencing 8 May 2023 (which is approximately 6 weeks away) or earlier. Please let us know dates you are available so we can book in a next face-to-face meeting.

We are grateful for our on-country meeting with you, Skyla and Clare and Ruby (as well as the welcome to country from your son Mark) on 14 March 2023. We want to let you know that, as a group of women, we feel privileged to have been welcomed to the beautiful country where we met and we appreciate you sharing your stories, cultural knowledge and your concerns with us.

We appreciate your request for us to attend the meeting with open hearts, deep listening and respectful conversation and we intend to continue this approach to our engagement. Our consultation process is ongoing through the environmental approval process and when an activity is being performed. We look forward to continuing our discussions with you in the future.

At our meeting, Woodside provided an overview of the Scarborough activities (Seismic EP, Subsea EP, D&C EP, SITI EP (Cth and State)), and you told us that the proposed activities give you a sick feeling and the activities should be stopped. You also let us know that, in your view, there is nothing that can be done by Woodside to progress with the proposed Scarborough activities in a way that could minimise impact to your functions, activities and interests or is respectful to your culture and country.

We confirm that we agreed not to share cultural details that you shared with us at the 14 March 2023 meeting. To respect this, we will not include cultural detail you shared with us at our meeting in Woodside's environment plans or in conversations with the Regulator. For clarity, as agreed, our proposed environment plans will confirm that we met with you on 14 March 2023 to continue consulting with you on the proposed Scarborough environment plans. So you are aware, this email as well as previous correspondence with SOS and Josie and Raelene will also be included in the proposed environment plans.

We took the following actions from the meeting. Responses are provided in italics:

• Provide background information on the "why" behind the Scarborough activities: Woodside's Scarborough Gas Project helps play a role in the global energy transition, helping neighbouring Asian countries take action on emissions reduction. There is further information on our website: Scarborough Gas Project and Pluto Train 2 - Woodside Energy.

Check with MAC as to whether MAC's ethnographic survey can be shared with Josie, Raelene and Save Our Songlines: The ethnographic survey is held by MAC and Woodside does not have permission to share it.

Confirm fracking in relation to the Scarborough activities: *There is no fracking to be undertaken as part of the proposed Scarborough activities.*

We want you to know that, as discussed, we are open to consulting further with you on the proposed Scarborough activities and are open to the continuing engagements regarding the Scarborough activities. Please let us know if further feedback for the activities proposed under the environment plans is sensitive and we will make this known to NOPSEMA upon submission to ensure this information remains confidential to NOPSEMA.

In the meantime, we are grateful to have met you and to have heard your perspectives on the Scarborough activities and Woodside.

Scarborough Gas Project Environment Plans

- 1. The Environmental Defenders Office acts for Ms Josie Alec and Ms Raelene Cooper in respect of the above matter.
- 2. We refer to correspondence between our clients and Woodside Energy Ltd (**Woodside**), into which you have been copied, in respect of the following environment plans:
 - (a) Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan;
 - (b) Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline Installation Environment Plan;
 - (c) Scarborough Drilling and Completions Environment Plan; and
 - (d) WA-61-L and WA-62-L Subsea Infrastructure Installation Environment Plan,

(together, Scarborough Environment Plans).

- 3. We understand that each of the Scarborough Environment Plans are currently before NOPSEMA for a decision under regs 10(1) and 10(4) of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) (Regulations). This information is gleaned from NOPSEMA's public website for environment plans that are under assessment. Woodside has not notified our client of any of the above environment plans being submitted to NOPSEMA nor the dates of the submissions.
- 4. Our clients' previous correspondence to Woodside and NOPSEMA sets out their general position and concerns as to engagement undertaken to date and their expectations for consultation under reg 11A of the Regulations.
- 5. Our clients had arranged a meeting with Woodside in Karratha for 13 June 2023, as part of consultation with our clients which is required by reg 11A of the Regulations.

- 6. The meeting scheduled for 13 June 2023 did not proceed and efforts to reschedule it are ongoing.
- 7. Our clients maintain that Woodside has not explained the activities the subject of the Scarborough Environment Plans, and associated impacts and risks in a way that they can clearly understand, and that they do not understand the risks and impacts of the activities the subject of the Scarborough Environment Plans on their functions, interests and activities. They maintain that that they have not been provided with sufficient information and a reasonable period for the consultation.
- 8. The fundamental requirement in the Regulations is that the titleholder must demonstrate that it has complied with its consultation obligations under reg 11A. It is our clients' position that NOPSEMA cannot be reasonably satisfied that the Scarborough Environment Plans demonstrate compliance with this criterion.
- 9. Our clients reiterate their requests that no environment plans be submitted or re-submitted by Woodside, and that NOPSEMA not accept any such environment plans, until Woodside has complied with its consultation obligations under reg 11A.

Woodside refers to your letter to NOPSEMA dated 28 June 2023 and thanks you for copying Woodside to that correspondence.

Woodside wishes to clarify points made in your letter in relation to consultation between Woodside and your clients, Josie Alec (Ms Alec), Raelene Cooper (Ms Cooper) and Save Our Songlines (SOS).

Woodside has consulted Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS pursuant to reg 11A of the Regulations in the course of preparing the Scarborough EPs for a significant period of time (since March 2022). As set out in paragraph two of your letter, these include the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey, Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline Installation, Scarborough Drilling and Completions and WA-61-L and WA-62-L Scarborough Subsea Infrastructure Installation environment plans. Woodside reaffirms that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS are listed as relevant persons in the Scarborough EPs, with their status as relevant persons confirmed to Ms Alec and Ms Cooper during the meeting between you, your clients and Woodside on 14 March 2023 (*March Meeting*).

The consultation between Woodside and Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS has been extensive and over an extended period. Woodside's letter to NOPSEMA dated 13 April 2023 (Subject: "RE: Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environmental Plan"), to which your firm was copied, summarises the extensive consultation that has taken place. Attachment A to that 13 April 2023 letter summarises Woodside's specific engagements with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS which at the time included 5 meetings, 2 attempted meetings, 19 emails, 7 phone calls and 10 letters.

At the March Meeting, the full details of which Woodside agreed to keep confidential at the request of your clients on the basis that some of the matters conveyed by your clients included secret women's business, an overview of the Scarborough Gas Project was provided to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS to support a further understanding of the activities to be carried out under the Scarborough EPs. Following the March Meeting, a suite of correspondence was exchanged where Woodside further explained those activities to enable Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS to make an informed assessment of the possible consequences of those activities on their functions, interests or activities. This was in addition to consultation material previously provided since August 2022 and the publicly accessible Scarborough EPs published in full on the NOPSEMA website (SCA Seismic Survey Environment Plan published in October 2021, SCA Drilling and Completions Environment Plan published in November 2021, SCA Seabed Intervention and Trunkline Installation Environment Plan published in December 2021 and SCA Subsea Installation Environment Plan published in June 2023).

During the March Meeting, without expressing to Woodside what their functions, activities and interests are (which matters remain unexpressed by you or your clients), Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS informed Woodside that nothing can be done by it to progress with the activities to be carried

out under the Scarborough EPs in a way that could minimise the affects of those activities on their undisclosed functions, interests or activities. Nonetheless, Woodside has continued and commits to continue to consult with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS in good faith in the event they have any matters they wish to communicate to Woodside that could be relevant to the Scarborough EPs.

Woodside has been prepared to meet (provided a reasonable time is allowed for travel arrangements for employees travelling from Perth), and has continued to correspond with your clients and your firm.

Given the length of time Ms Alec, Ms Cooper, SOS and Woodside have been engaged in consultation on the activities to be carried out under the Scarborough EPs, the information provided to you and your clients by Woodside, and you and your clients' responses to that consultation, Woodside considers that it has satisfied the requirements of reg 11A of the Regulations. Notwithstanding this, Woodside remains open and available to meet with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and SOS in good faith, and wishes to confirm our availability to meet from week commencing 3rd July 2023.

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





Thanks for the meeting with Josie, Raelene, Adrianna, Save Our Songlines, EDO and Woodside on Tuesday 25 July and for your email.

We acknowledge receipt of your email following that meeting.

Please can you pass the following to Josie, Raelene, Adrianna and Save Our Songlines.

Dear Josie, Raelene, Adrianna and Save our Songlines

Thanks for meeting with us via Teams on 25 July 2023. It was good to catch up and to consult with you again.

We confirm that we have sent a copy of the audio recording of the meeting to Ms Jess Border to provide to you.

In the meeting you asked some questions and requested information. Please see the **attached table** that provides responses and information requested.

We would like to highlight that we attended the meeting looking forward to hearing information from you and learning about your claims and objections and how Woodside can put in place controls to avoid or minimise impacts to those. We attended the meeting in good faith and ready for deep listening as requested in our previous meeting.

During the meeting you told us that you would not be speaking to us about your cultural interests, nor providing any feedback at this stage, despite agreeing to do so prior to the meeting. Further you stated in the meeting that you would not be able to speak to your cultural interests given we were not on Country. Given the number of times we have met, the amount of information that we have presented to you and the opportunities that have been given for information to be shared, we are concerned that the protracted engagement may be aimed at achieving outcomes other than to provide input to the Scarborough Project and related Environment Plans.

Next steps

We note that our July meeting was originally contemplated to take place in May 2023 (following the March meeting on Country). We also note that during our July meeting we offered to arrange fortnightly meetings to support consultation. We confirm that you declined that offer and that you noted that you will need some time to process the information and respond. You noted you will likely need at least 6 weeks to provide information to us.

To respect your request for a period of 6 weeks to process the information, we confirm our availability to meet on Country from the week commencing 4 September (or sooner). Please can you let us know your availability that week (or sooner).

Consultation

Please note that our preference is to continue to consult you on the Scarborough Project as a whole and to cover the four current Environment Plans. We think this is the best way forward as it presents an opportunity for you to understand the whole project and the links between the Environment Plans, locations and activities. Further, it provides you with an holistic picture and avoids limiting your ability to speak to your cultural interests, functions and activities based on a specific location.

We note that, for example, at the meeting whilst discussing the Scarborough Seismic EP you were interested in and asked some questions that were relevant to the Scarborough Drilling and Completions EP and also the Scarborough Seabed Intervention and Trunkline Installation EP, as well as the broader existing environment that is relevant to all Scarborough EPs. It was helpful for the bigger picture of the project to be presented in order to provide the context for those questions.

Other matters

Consultation - We confirm that the consultation has occurred in accordance with the regulations.

As per our letter dated 3 July 2023 to your lawyers (addressed to EDO, Ms Ruby Hamilton), we confirm that we have consulted pursuant to Reg 11A of the Regulations and in the course of preparing the Scarborough EPs for a significant period of time. Given the length of time involved, the amount of information provided and the opportunity given to consult, the requirements of Reg 11A have been met.

As per our letter dated 13 April 2023 (copied to EDO, Ms Clare Lakewood), we confirm that, from the website we understand that Save Our Songlines was established in November 2021. Consultation with you and Save Our Songlines has been ongoing since at least 15 December 2021, and as recently as 25 July 2023, Woodside has at all times reiterated that it remains open to engaging in further consultation.

There have been numerous exchanges of correspondence, efforts to meet, as well as meetings that took place on 14 March 2023 at Hearson Cove in Karratha and this 25 July 2023 meeting on-line. Woodside has provided ample opportunities to continue consultation and numerous offers to meet and to continue to meet.

Information has been provided that describes in detail, the activity proposed to be undertaken in the Scarborough EPs, the location, the duration, the risks, impacts and controls in place to minimise impacts and risks to as low as reasonably practicable and acceptable levels.

Our meeting consultation materials are prepared and developed on the basis of the extensive information contained in the EPs, consultation information sheets, and summaries, all of which have been provided to you and your legal representatives. The information has not materially changed over the various submissions of the EPs and provides material to understand the activities.

The questions you have asked and the dialogue that we have had with you has shown a high level of understanding of the Scarborough Project. The Save Our Songlines website contains views on the Scarborough Project, summaries of the Scarborough Project, YouTube videos as well as links to other websites which also express opinions on the Scarborough Project.

Seagrasses are a primary producer, i.e., they are dependent on sunlight for photosynthesis (energy production for growth and reproduction). Seagrass habitat is largely restricted to sheltered and shallow waters.

 The collision must have enough force to penetrate the vessel hull. The collision must be in the exact location of the fuel tank. Follow up questions

We look forward to receiving responses to the following requests for further information from Woodside:

- 1. The depth of the wells both at and below sea level.
- 2. Have Woodside identified or done any mapping of freshwater systems in the EMBA?
- 3. What is the basis for the information on the whale migration patterns (we understand this comes from ACMS, government documents and consultation with Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation but would like further clarification and detail)?
- 4. Please provide the information underlying migratory patterns of whales, dugongs, turtles.
- 5. Please provide any information that has been collated about seagrass.
- 6. Please provide the underlying information for the modelling about the risk i.e. the 'worst possible scenario' discussion.

In addition to the above, our clients would appreciate clarification of the decibels and range of the seismic surveying that is to take place.

Next steps

As we discussed, it will take some time for our clients to process the information provided today and to respond to that information.

Woodside heard from our clients today about the importance of storytelling generally and of storytelling on Country. For this reason, our clients intend to provide Woodside with their initial response by way of video, taken on Murujuga. Following this, we propose that a second meeting be held to discuss our clients' response and to engage in further discussion. Our clients' first response is intended to be preliminary in nature and may need to be supplemented given that they are waiting on further information from Woodside.

We suggest that this approach be adopted for each EP in due course. That is:

- 1. Initial meeting to discuss an overview of the relevant EP, at which further requests for information can be made and questions asked about the information provided.
- 2. Initial response from Josie and Rae (could occur either before or after provision of further information, depending on our clients' availability).
- 3. Second meeting to discuss Josie and Rae's response, and responsive measures to mitigate risks and impacts of the activities.
- 4. Opportunity for Josie and Rae to provide supplementary information, if necessary. This may require a further meeting(s).

The approach should be flexible to ensure our clients are given ample opportunity to ask questions, share their knowledge, and be heard.

Other matters

Finally, our clients would be grateful if Woodside could provide the following:

- 1. Confirmation that the meetings held this morning forms part of the consultation prescribed by regulation 25 of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations* 2023 (formerly regulation 11A of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations* 2009) in relation to the Seismic EP.
- 2. Detail in relation to Woodside's proposed payment to our clients for consultation meetings.

Please let me know if you have any comments or concerns in relation to the above. We otherwise look forward to receiving the further information and recording.

In the circumstances we remain concerned that activity may commence before the compulsory consultation requirements are completed; and more specifically, that you may commence activity over the course of the weekend. In these circumstances we continue to reserve the right to issue an application seeking injunctive relief today, a course which will be productive of unnecessary costs and an unnecessary demand on Court time outside of normal sitting hours.

We refer to previous correspondence which references the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic EP), accepted by NOPSEMA on 31 July 2023, with conditions. Please see the notes below and the attachments.

With reference to Condition 6 of the conditions, we respectfully seek to consult with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines on the Seismic EP changes and the control measures proposed to be adopted to manage potential impacts and risks of the activity to as low as reasonably practicable (ALARP) and acceptable levels. Following consultation, if relevant comments are provided, Woodside intends on submitting to NOPSEMA a report confirming the views of Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, in accordance with Condition 6 b).

We note that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines most recently noted that they would be available for a consultation meeting in the week commencing 4 September 2023. We remain open to consulting with them and would be grateful to obtain their available dates for that meeting in September or sooner.

We otherwise note the following in relation to the relevant conditions regarding consultation.

Condition 1

- 1. Prior to commencement of the activity, the titleholders must consult with registered native title bodies corporate, representative Aboriginal / Torres Strait Islander bodies and other persons or organisations identified as a relevant person in relation to the First Nations cultural heritage in Tables 5-3 and 5-4 of the EP to confirm whether:
 - a. They are aware of any people, who in accordance with Indigenous tradition, may have spiritual and cultural connections to the environment that may be affected by the activity that have not yet been afforded the opportunity to provide information that may inform the management of the activity
 - b. There is any information they wish to provide on cultural features and/or heritage values.

We confirm that, prior to commencement of the activity, Woodside consulted Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, requesting the above information on 3 August and 9 August 2023.

In addition to the extensive consultation opportunities afforded to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines during the preparation of the Seismic EP, Woodside consulted with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines after the submission of the Seismic EP on the following dates:

- 1. A meeting held between Woodside and Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines on 25 July 2023;
- 2. Correspondence exchanged following that meeting, including emails exchanged from 25 July to present.

Condition 2

2. The purpose of the consultation outlined in Condition 1 is to be communicated, and relevant persons are provided with a copy of the NOPSEMA Consultation on offshore environment plans Brochure as part of consultation

In a number of pieces of correspondence, including those of 3 August and 9 August 2023, Woodside communicated the purpose of consultation and also provided to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, the NOPSEMA Consultation on offshore petroleum environment plans brochure.

Condition 3

3. The method of consultation is informed by the relevant persons being consulted.

Meetings with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines have been informed by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines. From recent correspondence, Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines requested at least 6 weeks time before having another meeting. Our understanding is that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines intend to provide us with their available dates in September for a meeting on country. As described above, Woodside remains available to meet at your earliest convenience.

Condition 4

4. If at any time, as a result of compliance with Condition 1, relevant persons are identified, they must be consulted in accordance with the NOPSEMA Guideline on Consultation in the course of preparing an environment plan (GL2086).

Woodside notes that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines have referenced Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation but have not otherwise made us aware of other persons.

Condition 5

- 5. At any time, prior to or during the activity, if new cultural features and/or heritage values of places within the environment that may be affected by the activity are identified that are not described in the EP, the titleholders must:
 - a. Ensure the environmental impacts and risks of the activity continue to be managed to as low as reasonably practicable and an acceptable level.
 - b. Notify NOPSEMA in writing within 7 days of these cultural and/or heritage values of paces and the potential environmental impacts and risks.

Woodside has considered the topics raised by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines at the meeting on 25 July 2023 and has proposed amendments to the Seismic EP, in accordance with Woodside's Management of Knowledge and Management of Change processes. The proposed changes to the Seismic EP are outlined in Attachment A.

Woodside has also notified NOPSEMA, in accordance with this condition, to advise of the topics raised by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines at the meeting on 25 July 2023 and outlined the potential environmental impacts and risks to those topics.

Condition 6

- 6. The titleholders must submit a report to NOPSEMA no later than 14 days after the notification in Condition 5 which confirms the following:
 - a. The control measures that have been adopted to ensure that the environmental impacts and risks

of the activity will be reduced to as low as reasonably practicable and an acceptable level.

b. The consultation undertaken with any relevant persons to develop those control measures including

i.The control measures that those persons considered reasonably necessary to manage impacts on the cultural features and/or heritage values in accordance with indigenous tradition; and

ii. The views of the relevant persons in relation to the control measures

Woodside has developed the information in the attachments in accordance with Condition 6 a). As set out above, we respectfully seek to consult with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save our Songlines on the week commencing 4 September or sooner on the Seismic EP changes and the control measures proposed to be adopted to manage potential impacts and risks of the activity, on the topics raised by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, to ALARP and acceptable levels.

For clarity, Woodside intends on submitting to NOPSEMA a report on the views of Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, in accordance with Condition 6 b).

Please confirm when Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines are available to consult as noted above. Woodside is ready, willing and able to meet and consult with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines.

4.10 Socio-Economic Environment

4.10.1 Cultural Values and Heritage

4.10.1.1 **Background**

Woodside recognises the 'environment' for the purpose of the evaluation required under the **Environment Regulations includes:**

- the heritage value of places; and
- the social, economic, and cultural features of the broader environment.

In this section, the heritage value of places within the Operational Area and EMBA and the cultural features of the Operational Area and EMBA are described.

In line with The Burra Charter: The Australia ICOMOS Charter for Places of Cultural Significance (ICOMOS 2013) (Burra Charter) and associated practice notes. Woodside understands heritage value to refer to the cultural significance of a place to an individual or group. A cultural feature, by contrast, is understood to be comparable to the Burra Charter term "fabric" and refer to a place's elements, fixtures, contents and objects which have cultural values. Although these features are necessarily physical, the place they inhabit or comprise may have tangible or intangible dimensions (ICOMOS 2013).

Woodside has undertaken archaeological assessments and ethnographic surveys to identify potential cultural values or features that may be impacted by Scarborough activities. These works have not identified heritage places, objects or values which will be impacted by the activities planned under this EP. However, through consultation with relevant persons, Woodside recognises the deep spiritual and cultural connection to the environment² that First Nations people hold.

4.10.1.2 **First Nations peoples**

As a starting point for understanding social and cultural features of the environment for Indigenous (First Nations) groups, Woodside uses the existing systems, such as native title, to identify Indigenous groups that may have functions, interests or activities that may be affected. To that end, Woodside identifies native title representative bodies and nominated representative entities, as well <mark>as</mark> native title claims, determinations and Indigenous Land Use Agreements (ILUAs) which the EMBA overlaps. While acknowledging that cultural features and heritage values may exist outside of the native title framework, native title claims, determinations and ILUAs are defined under the Native Title Act 1993 (Cth). Woodside considers this to be the broadest extent over which Indigenous groups have claimed native title rights and interests.

Native title claims are applications made to the Federal Court under the Native Title Act for a determination or decision about native title in a particular area. A claim is made by a native title claim group which asserts it holds native title rights and interests in an area of land and/or water, according to its traditional laws and customs. By making a claim, the native title claim group seeks a decision that native title exists so that its native title rights and interests are recognised by the common law of Australia. This is called a native title determination. A determination is a decision by a recognised body, such as the Federal Court or High Court of Australia, that native title either does or does not exist in relation to a particular area (Native Title Tribunal).

²Definition of 'Environment' in Regulation 4 of the OPPGS (Environment) Regulations are defined as:

- a) ecosystems and their constituent parts, including people and communities; and
- b) natural and physical resources; and

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- c) the qualities and characteristics of locations, places and areas; and
- the heritage values of places; and includes
- the social, economic and cultural features of the matters mentioned in paragraphs (a), (b), (c) and (d)

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Feedback Received via Consultation to Inform Existing Environment Description

Indigenous cultural values are communally held. This is reflected in Vision 3 of Dhawura Ngilan that "Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage is managed... according to community ownership" (Heritage Chairs of Australia and New Zealand 2021). Dhawura Ngilan also specifically notes that "Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander... intangible knowledge systems, which are held in songlines and language, are endangered. This knowledge is held by Elders and the community..." Through consultation with relevant persons, Registered Native Title Bodies Corporate have identified or raised topics relating to environmental values of cultural interest. These include a broad interest in the marine fauna, including whales, sharks and turtles (See Table 5-4).

In addition, some persons or organisations who identified as a relevant person in relation to First Nations cultural heritage, have indicated knowledge of cultural features or heritage values potentially affected by this PAP. These cultural features or heritage values may not have been raised through Woodside's consultation with the indigenous community representatives and elders, including through MAC and Wirrawandi Aboriginal Corporate who represent the communities which these persons or organisations identified with (See Table 5-4).

It is feasible that additional cultural and broader interests in the environment are known, but no further definition has been shared with Woodside. These are identified below:

- Whales (including migration patterns)
- Turtles
- Dugongs
- Plankton
- Seagrass
- Energy lines (unspecified)
- Songlines and dreaming (unspecified)
- Where saltwater and freshwater meet

Seagrasses are a primary producer, i.e., they are dependent on sunlight for photosynthesis (energy production for growth and reproduction) and therefore have not been recorded and are not predicted to occur in the EMBA as water depths are over 200 m (Table 4-4). As dugongs feed exclusively on seagrass they are also not predicted to occur within the EMBA (Appendix C). In addition, there are no freshwater systems within the EMBA.

The marine ecosystem description in Section 4.10.1.5 encompasses the description of the cultural features and Sections 4.6.2 and 4.6.3 provides a description of turtles and marine cetaceans respectively.

Woodside has committed to ongoing engagement to further understand these values. The Program of Ongoing Engagement with Traditional Custodians (Appendix J), provides a mechanism for ongoing dialogue between Woodside and Traditional Custodians. The program enables Woodside to manage uncertainty on the impacts and risks to cultural values which may be identified at any time during Woodside's activities via ongoing dialogue with Traditional Custodians. As an example Woodside is developing a framework for ongoing consultation with BTAC (Section 7.4). Should feedback be received (including any relevant new information on cultural values), it will be assessed and, where appropriate, Woodside will apply its Management of Change and Revision process (see Section 7.7).

4.10.1.6 Intangible Cultural Features

Oral Songlines are often described by Aboriginal people as the law of the land and make up part of the Dreaming (Neale and Kelly 2020:30). Songlines are viewed in Western academia as a framework for relating people to land and consist of a series of invisible, interconnected routes across the landscape that mark significant sites for Aboriginal people (Higgins 2021:723). Songlines demonstrate Aboriginal peoples' strong connections to land by revealing sacred knowledge that is

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place-specific (Roberts 2023:5). The land's physical features are instrumental in maintaining songlines because this is how ancestral spirits journeyed through, and interacted with, the physical landscape leaving sacred knowledge behind. The interconnection between the physical and spiritual is where songlines become intrinsically tied to significant places across Country. As a result, geographical landforms are recorded within songlines and become sacred places. Such landforms can include inter alia: rocks, mountains, rivers, caves and hills (Higgins 2021:724). Songlines can become lost, fragmented or broken when there is a loss of Country or forced removal from Country (Neale and Kelly 2020:30). Physical sites that have been identified as comprising a component of a songline are important to protect in order to prevent the fragmenting or breaking apart of songlines and loss of sacred cultural knowledge. While no specific details of songlines have been provided by relevant persons during consultation for this Activity, it can be confirmed that no landforms typical of songlines have been identified or are anticipated to be impacted by the Activity.

In Australia, songlines can stretch thousands of kilometres, making up a complex and organic network of stories containing cultural knowledge of First Nations communities across the land (Neale and Kelly 2020:35). Songlines can also extend out to Sea Country and contain cultural knowledge that is tied to geographic features, atmospheric phenomena and marine plants and animals. Often songlines containing references to a seascape or Sea Country make mention of mythical events occurring around marine life, fishing areas, submerged rocks or coral. Songlines that embody seascapes can reflect how a group may relate to, or value, Sea Country—for example connections to nearby islands that they once inhabited in their songlines (Smyth and Isherwood 2016:307). Songlines can also be used as proof of long-standing connection to land and support a legal entitlement to land rights (Higgins 2021:74). Examples where songlines contain strong references to Sea Country are more common in Pacific Islander and Torres Strait Islander communities, who often refer to seascapes and skylines in their songlines in order to communicate sacred knowledge that assists in safe navigation of the ocean (Neale and Kelly 2020:83-84).

4.10.1.7 Indigenous Archaeological Heritage Assessment

Woodside understands that communal cultural connection may exist between Traditional Custodians and land and waters. It is understood from the onshore archaeological record that Aboriginal people have occupied the Australian continent for at least 65,000 years (Clarkson et al 2017) and in many places maintain a strong continuing connection that is said to extend back in Indigenous cosmology to the beginning of time.

It is understood that the sea level has risen significantly during the 65,000 years of Indigenous occupation, and areas that were once inhabited are now submerged on the continental shelf (Veth et al 2019; UWA 2021). Woodside also understands that, at its lowest level during Indigenous occupation, sea level was between 125 m (O'Leary et al 2020, Veth et al 2019, Williams et al 2018) and 130 m below current levels (Benjamin et al 2020, Benjamin et al 2023, UWA 2021). Archaeological material preserved on the Ancient Landscape has the potential to provide further information about the earliest periods of human occupation (Veth et al 2019; UWA 2021).

Recent archaeological discoveries demonstrate that the now submerged landscape was occupied and inhabited, and can retain archaeological material from this time (Benjamin et al, 2020, Benjamin et al 2023; see Ward et al 2021 for an opposing view).

In recognition of this, Woodside considers the Ancient Landscape between the mainland and the Ancient Coastline KEF (see Figure 4-12) as an area where potential Indigenous archaeological material may exist on the seabed, as this covers the full extent of this possible Indigenous occupation. The Operational Area does not overlap the Ancient Landscape. There is slight overlap of the EMBA with the Ancient Landscape but no potential for seabed disturbance from planned activities and therefore no potential for impacts to archaeological material.

Known Indigenous heritage places including archaeological sites may be protected subject to declarations under the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984,

Project Vessels (including the towed seismic equipment)

The Petroleum Activities Program will be conducted using a single seismic vessel. A temporary 3 nm SNA will be maintained around the seismic vessel and towed array (comprising the airgun array and streamer array, which includes header buoys, starboard and port deflectors or baravanes, streamers and tail buoys) during seismic operations. Marine users are requested to avoid this area during the survey to ensure the safety of the seismic vessel and third-party vessels.

The support vessel will accompany the seismic vessel to re-supply it with fuel and other logistical and operational supplies (including taking the seismic vessel under tow, if required). An additional chase vessel may be used to manage interactions with shipping and fishing activities, if required. It is intended that a dedicated spotter vessel with two MFOs aboard will be deployed ahead of the seismic vessel during all activities with seismic source discharge.

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Impact Assessment

Potential Impacts to Environmental Values

Commercial Fishing

Potential for interaction with commercial fisheries is a common consideration for marine seismic surveys. Should any commercial fishing activities occur within the Operational Area, commercial fishers may be asked to deviate from fishing grounds periodically to accommodate seismic survey operations, any potential interactions with commercial fisheries would be short term due to the transient nature of the seismic vessel and the small area occupied by the seismic vessel (and SNA) at any one time, and limited to operational inconvenience (navigational hazard) and temporary displacement from fishing grounds within the Operational Area.

There are a number of Commonwealth and State managed fisheries with management areas that overlap with the Operational Area, however, none of these fisheries have conducted any fishing activities within the Operational Area in at least the last 10 years. There is only one Commonwealth managed fishery (Western Deepwater Trawl Fishery) and one State managed fishery (West Coast Deep Sea Crustacean Managed Fishery) that have historically had catch/effort within the Operational Area prior to 2010. There has been no recent fishing catch/effort within the Operational Area from 2008-2019 (Woodhams and Bath 2017; Patterson et al., 2020) and 2018- 2022 (DPIRD, 2022), respectively (refer to **Section 4.10.2**). The Operational Area is located in water depths ranging from about 800-1150 m, located outside of the depth range where significant fisheries effort normally occurs.

Given the lack of fishing catch/effort in the Operational Area in recent years, it is expected that there will be no impact to commercial fisheries as a result of the presence of the proposed Scarborough 4D B1 MSS.

Recreational Fishing and Tourism Operations

The presence of project vessels and submersible equipment has the potential to impact third party vessels within or adjacent to the Operational Area. Interactions could result in short-term displacement of vessels as they make course alterations to avoid the project vessels (and associated towed seismic equipment in the SNA)

However, the Operational Area is considered too far offshore for recreational fishing or tourism activities to occur. Therefore, it is expected that there will be no impact to recreational fishing or tourism activities as a result of the presence of the proposed Scarborough 4D B1 MSS.

Commercial Shipping

The presence of project vessels and submersible equipment may cause temporary disruptions to commercial shipping. Moderate density shipping traffic may be encountered in the northeast corner of the Operational Area.

The potential impacts to commercial shipping vessels are expected to include short-term displacement of vessels as they make slight course alterations to avoid the project vessels (and associated towed seismic equipment in the SNA).

Oil and Gas Activities

No oil and gas production wells or facilities are located within the Operational Area (refer to **Figure 4-15**). Therefore, no impacts to oil and gas activities are expected.

Defence

The DoD did not identify any activities within the NWXA however the potential for UXOs was raised. Based on the locations of the proposed activity and potential UXOs it was determined that there is no credible risk from UXOs for the proposed activity.

Cultural Values and Heritage

The physical presence of vessels in the Operational Area may lead to interactions affecting cultural features and heritage value of place. Despite requesting it in consultation, information relating specifically to potential cultural values has not been provided to Woodside. No specific information has been provided relating to current songlines (currently undefined) and energy lines (currently undefined) that were indicated as topics during consultation with traditional custodians. To address this uncertainty, Woodside is implementing a program of ongoing consultation with Traditional Custodians whose functions, interests and activities may be affected by the Petroleum Activities Program (C1.7 and C1.8). While no specific details of songlines have been provided by relevant persons during consultation for this Activity, no landforms typical of songlines are anticipated to be impacted by the Activity.

The potential impact consequence from the physical presence of vessels on cultural features and heritage values may be slight (E) and short-term impact (less than one year) to a community or areas/items of cultural significance. Given the short duration of the activity, no impacts to landforms associated with songlines and no significant impact to migratory species (including whales and turtles) impacts are expected to be slight or less.

Cumulative Assessment

Commercial Fishing

As above, there has been no recent fishing catch/effort within the Operational Area for the Commonwealth Western Deepwater Trawl Fishery (2008-2019) and WA West Coast Deep Sea Crustacean Managed Fishery (2010-2019), and therefore no impacts to commercial fisheries are expected. There are no other known seismic surveys planned to occur in these fisheries and, therefore, no cumulative impacts are expected.

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Commercial Shipping

The Operational Area overlaps with a shipping fairway and north-south international shipping traffic. There are no other known seismic surveys planned to occur on the west coast of WA that may interact with the same international vessels within the fairway and, therefore, no cumulative impacts to shipping are expected.

Summary of Potential Impacts to Environmental Values(s)

Given the adopted controls, it is considered that physical presence of project vessels (including towed seismic equipment) will not result in a potential impact greater than slight, short-term temporary displacement of commercial shipping. Commercial vessels may be required to make small alterations to their course to avoid the project vessels (and associated towed seismic equipment in the SNA) but these interactions can be managed in accordance with standard maritime practices.

ALARP Statement

On the basis of the environmental impact assessment outcomes and use of the relevant tools appropriate to the decision type (i.e. Decision Type A), Woodside considers the adopted controls appropriate to manage the impacts and risks of the physical presence of the project vessels on other marine users, which is expected to be limited to commercial shipping movements. As no reasonable additional/alternative controls were identified that would further reduce the impacts and risks without grossly disproportionate sacrifice, the impacts and risks are considered ALARP.

Demonstration of Acceptability

Acceptability Statement

The impact assessment has determined that, given the adopted controls, physical presence of the project vessels (and associated towed seismic equipment in the SNA) is unlikely to result in potential impact greater than slight, short-term impact to other marine users, such as commercial shipping. In addition, these activities will not interfere with other marine users rights to a greater extent than is necessary. Further opportunities to reduce the impacts and risks have been investigated above.

The adopted controls are considered good oil-field practice/industry best practice and meet expectations of AMSA and AHO provided during consultation with stakeholders. The potential impacts and risks are considered broadly acceptable if the adopted controls are implemented.

Woodside has considered Woodside acknowledges that uncertainty on cultural values may remain; however, the Ongoing Program on Traditional Custodian Feedback (EPO 17 and C1.7) has been developed to enable Woodside to manage potential uncertainty on the impacts and risks to cultural values which may be identified at any time during Woodside's activities via ongoing dialogue with Traditional Custodians. Any new information identified as part of this process will be managed to ALARP and an Acceptable level of impact (EPO 18 and C 1.8).

Therefore, Woodside considers the adopted controls appropriate to manage the impacts and risks of the physical presence of the project vessels (and associated towed seismic equipment in the SNA) to a level that is broadly acceptable.

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Impact Assessment

Noting that no commercial fisheries operate within or near the Operational Area (refer to **Section 4.10.2**) and the Operational Area does not provide suitable habitat or water depths for target fish or crustacean species, no physical or behavioural impacts are predicted to commercial fish stocks and no impacts are predicted to commercial fishery catch rates.

Commercial Fisheries - Impact Assessment Conclusion

Based on the assessment above and the implementation of the identified control measures, the consequence of occasional short-term and localised disturbance to the target species and catch rates of commercial fisheries is of no lasting effect (less than one month) and impacts will not be significant to commercial fisheries.

Cultural features and Heritage Values

It is noted that the marine ecosystem holds both cultural and environmental value (See **Section 4.10.1**), with these types of values (cultural and environmental) intrinsically linked any cultural values linked to environment receptors, have been assessed above and below. Woodside has conducted extensive consultation with Traditional Custodian groups as described in Section 5, resulting in the identification of environmental values of cultural interests specified in Section 4.10.1.5.

An assessment of marine environmental values of cultural interest to First Nations is described in Table 6-10.

Given the short duration of the activity, no impacts to landforms associated with songlines and no significant impact to migratory species (including whales and turtles) impacts are expected to be slight or less.

It is acknowledged that there is uncertainty in Woodside's understanding of potential cultural values within the Operational Area and EMBA therefore Woodside is implementing a program of ongoing consultation with Traditional Custodians whose functions, interests and activities may be affected by the Petroleum Activities Program (C1.7).

Marine Protected Areas

Impact Assessment

As described in **Section 4.9**, the Operational Area does not overlap with any Commonwealth or State Marine Parks. However, Australian Marine Parks (AMPs) are located in the wider EMBA that are part of the North-west Marine Park Networks.

The nearest marine park is the Gascoyne AMP, located 33 km south of the Operational Area and approximately 44 km of the Active Source Area at the closest point. Maximum received sound levels at the boundary of the Gascoyne AMP are predicted to be approximately 140 dB re 1 µPa (SPL).

The potential impacts to the natural, social and economic values of the Gascoyne AMP are summarised as follows.

- Exmouth Plateau KEF The Operational Area and Active Source Area are located within the KEF. As assessed above, the potential impacts to benthic communities will be highly localised, temporary and negligible in the context of natural variability. The productivity, ecological function and value of the KEF will not be affected.
- Continental slope demersal fish communities KEF The KEF is located over 150 km from the Active Source Area. Underwater sound emissions will not affect the demersal fish communities in this KEF.
- Canyons linking Cuvier abyssal plain and Cape Range peninsula KEF The KEF is located over 105 km from the Active Source Area. Underwater sound emissions will not affect the benthic invertebrate or fish communities in this KEF.
- Commonwealth waters adjacent to Ningaloo Reef KEF The KEF is located over 170 km from the Active Source
 Area. Underwater sound emissions will not affect the coral reef communities, deep water filter feeder
 communities or marine fauna that aggregate or migrate within the KEF.
- Humpback whale migratory pathway As assessed above, received sound levels at the humpback whale migration BIA are predicted to be below 130 dB re 1 μ Pa SPL. No significant behavioural response is expected and the BIA is well beyond the maximum range in which TTS effects could occur.

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7.10.2 Routine Reporting (External)

7.10.2.1 Ongoing Consultation

In accordance with Regulation 14 (9) of the Environment Regulations, the implementation strategy must provide for appropriate consultation with relevant authorities of the Commonwealth, a State or Territory and other relevant interested persons or organisations.

Woodside's approach to ongoing consultation is that feedback and comments received from relevant persons and additional persons continue to be assessed and responded to, as required, through the life of an EP, including during EP assessment and throughout the duration of the accepted EP, in accordance with the intended outcome of consultation (as set out in **Section 5.2**).

Woodside proposes to undertake the engagements with directly impacted relevant persons and additional persons listed **in Table 7-3.** Relevant new information identified during ongoing consultation will be assessed using the EP Management of Knowledge (refer to **Section 7.6.1.2** and Management of Change Process (refer to **Section 7.7**).

Woodside has developed a Program of Ongoing Engagement with Traditional Custodians (Appendix J), directly informed by feedback from Traditional Custodians. It provides a mechanism for ongoing dialogue so that Traditional Custodians can, on an ongoing basis, provide Woodside with feedback relating to the possible consequences of an activity to be carried out under an Environment Plan on their functions, interests and activities as they relate to cultural values. The program enables Woodside to manage uncertainty on the impacts and risks to cultural values which may be identified at any time during Woodside's activities via ongoing dialogue with Traditional Custodians.

Woodside hosts community forums at which members are provided updates on Woodside activities on a regular basis (for example community reference group meetings). Representatives who present at those meetings are from community and industry and include Woodside, State Government (for instance relevant Regional Development Commissions), Local Government, Indigenous Groups, industry representative bodies, Community and industry organisations.

Relevant persons, additional persons and those who are merely interested in the activities, can otherwise remain up to date on this activity through subscribing to the Woodside website, or by reading the publicly available version of the EP on NOPSEMA's website, where available.

Should consultation feedback be received following EP acceptance that identifies a measure or control that requires implementation or update to meet the intended outcome of consultation (see **Section 5.2**), Woodside will apply its EP Management of Knowledge process (refer to **Section 7.6.1.2**) and Management of Change process (refer to **Section 7.7**), as appropriate.

Woodside has established and maintains a publicly available, up to date and interactive map to provide stakeholders with updated information on activities being conducted as part of the Petroleum Activities Program particularly during SIMOPS. The interactive map is available on Woodside's website (Section 6.6.1, PS 1.6).

The ongoing consultation engagements that Woodside intends to progress for this EP are set out in the table below.

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Proposed Program of Ongoing Engagement with Traditional Custodians

This Program of Ongoing Engagement with Traditional Custodians ("Program") has been developed to demonstrate Woodside's commitment to ongoing engagement and support of Traditional Custodians' capacity to care for and manage Country, including Sea Country, and has been directly informed by Traditional Custodians' feedback regarding their capacity to engage and consult on Environment Plans.

It is a living document designed to evolve with ongoing consultation and feedback from Traditional Custodians and, at a minimum, will be subject to annual review. In addition to this Program, Woodside will continue to participate in, and support collective industry engagement with Traditional Owners on the development of a future, sustainable, industry wide Program. Through the Program, Woodside actively supports Traditional Custodians' capacity for, and involvement in, ongoing engagement and feedback on environment plans.

The Program has been developed so that Traditional Custodians can, on an ongoing basis, provide Woodside with feedback relating to the possible consequences of an activity to be carried out under an environment plan on their functions, interests and activities as they relate to cultural values. This feedback will be evaluated in conjunction with Traditional Custodians and, where necessary, avoidance or mitigation strategies in will be developed in collaboration with Traditional Custodians.

The Program enables Woodside to manage uncertainty on the impacts and risks to cultural values which may be identified at any time during Woodside's activities via ongoing dialogue with Traditional Custodians.

How the Program is implemented with specific Traditional Custodians will depend on their stated needs and priorities

The Program is underpinned by Woodside's First Nations Communities Policy (woodside.com), the objective of which is to ensure Woodside partners and engages with First Nations communities to create positive economic, social and cultural outcomes that leave a lasting legacy. Woodside does this through building respectful relationships and partnerships with First Nations communities where we are active, in the areas where they are most interested in. We acknowledge the unique connection that First Nations communities have to land, waters and the environment.

The Program will include, as agreed with relevant communities, reasonable commitment to:

1. Support for ongoing dialogue and engagement

Woodside will support the capacity of Traditional Custodians to participate in ongoing dialogue and engagement about the environment plans and to enable the ongoing identification of cultural values potentially impacted by Woodside's activities. Woodside further commits to agreeing consultation protocols with individual Traditional Custodians to ensure the material provided is appropriate in level of detail such that the potential for cultural impact from Woodside activities can be determined and as required measures can be adopted to avoid or minimise impact.

In addition, Woodside will receive feedback on cultural values from an individual person or organisation that identifies as a Traditional Custodian, at any stage during the development and implementation of activities. This feedback will be evaluated, in conjunction with the Traditional Custodian individual or group and if required, control measures will put in place to avoid impacts to cultural values, or where avoidance is not possible, to minimise and mitigate the impacts to an acceptable level.

Where cultural values are identified post activity completion, any controls relevant to value management will be implemented during the next relevant activity.



2. Support for the identification and recording of cultural features

Woodside will support Traditional Custodians to record and articulate their Sea Country values and will invest in cultural assessments codesigned with Traditional Custodians, where required, to inform potential risks to cultural values from our petroleum activities.

This may include supporting cultural mapping by Traditional Custodians to identify and map significant cultural features including archaeological sites and other cultural values. The scoping of the mapping process will be codesigned with Traditional Custodians.

Woodside understands that cultural knowledge remains the intellectual property of Traditional Custodians and will agree with Traditional Custodians at the outset how that information from surveys will be used to feedback into and inform the environment plan's design and implementation.

In addition, Woodside applies the Cultural Heritage Management Procedure 2019, updated in 2023, to the Program which:

- provides a process for the identification, protection, and management of Cultural Heritage
 taking into account relevant standards, in particular, the United Nations Declaration on the
 Rights of Indigenous Peoples, the Charter for the Protection and Management of the
 Archaeological Heritage, the Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural
 Heritage, and the Convention on the Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage;
- applies to underwater cultural heritage and, consistent with current practice, provides for the commissioning of (where appropriate) both archaeological and ethnographic assessments of cultural values over the submerged landscape; and
- the process includes the following:
 - early engagement with relevant Traditional Custodians
 - identification of potential heritage, this could include desktop and field surveys undertaken with the Traditional Custodians.
- the development of cultural management strategies; and, where it is determined cultural heritage may be impacted, the development of Cultural Heritage Management Plans codesigned with Traditional Custodians and implemented by Woodside's First Nations team which:
 - o focus on avoidance or minimisation of impacts; and
 - provide regular reviews and for inclusion of new information and further development of the Cultural Heritage Management Plan.

Woodside is committed to continue to receive feedback on cultural values for the life of an environment plan, the inclusion of new information and the development of avoidance or mitigation strategies in collaboration with Traditional Custodians. This information will be recorded via the Woodside Management of Knowledge Process and any potential impacts to the accepted Environment Plan evaluated via the Woodside Management of Change Process.

3. Building capacity for the ongoing protection of country

Woodside will support measures to increase the capability and capacity of the Traditional Custodian groups. This is guided by Woodside's Indigenous Affairs Strategy 2019 ("Strategy"), which is designed to enable the building and maintaining of relationships with Traditional Custodians to leave a lasting legacy, including strengthening of Traditional Custodians' capacity to care for and manage Country, including Sea Country. The Strategy was developed with inputs from Traditional Custodians and contains four pillars that direct Woodside's social investment, policies relating to economic development, procurement and employment, and Woodside's agreement making and implementation of agreements. The pillars are:

- Culture and Heritage Management: support social outcomes through protection, recognition and respect for culture and heritage:
- 2. Economic Participation: provide training, jobs, and business opportunities;



- 3. Capability and capacity: ensure strong corporate governance, leadership development and education initiatives to support self-determination; and
- 4. Safer and Healthier Communities: partner with Aboriginal people and service providers to maximise safer and healthier community outcomes.

Woodside is committed to an ongoing relationship between Woodside and the Traditional Custodian groups. Through consultation with Traditional Custodians Woodside will continue to:

- establish support for Indigenous ranger programs via social investment;
- establish support for Indigenous oil spill response capability via investigating training models;
- establish support for identification and recording of cultural values and the management of that information by Traditional Custodians;
- establish support for programs identified by the Traditional Custodians as important to them and as agreed by Woodside.

4. Support for capacity and capability in relation to governance

Pillar 3 of the Indigenous Affairs Strategy 2019 focuses on ensuring strong corporate governance, leadership development and education initiatives to support self-determination. To enable this, Woodside will support measures to increase the capability and capacity of the Traditional Custodian groups, including in relation to governance and management systems.

The nature of this support will be informed by the individual needs of Traditional Custodian groups, but may include:

- funding or other support for community meetings, particularly where consultation with representative bodies lies outside of that body's core business and cultural authority or mandate needs to be secured,
- resourcing internal expertise so that information is managed consistently and internally, including ensuring appropriate record keeping of consultation to provide stakeholders with a lasting record of discussions, and
- development or upgrade of IT systems to manage information.

Program Reporting and Review of Effectiveness

Woodside will undertake an annual review of the Program to assess its effectiveness and adapt the Program accordingly. The annual review will also include an assessment of appropriateness of the methods used to undertake ongoing consultation with Traditional Custodians.

Progress of the Program will be reported annually in line with annual sustainability reporting via the Woodside website.

A commitment to the Program will be included in all new and revised Environment Plans in the format below:

We understand that the consultation will take place on a no-admission basis given the diverging views of the parties. For the avoidance of doubt, we reiterate our clients' position that consultation has not occurred as required by and in accordance with the Regulations or the conditions.

Thank you for your offer of a two-day workshop. As you will be aware, the NOPSEMA guideline on Consultation in the Court of Preparing an Environment Plan (**Guideline**) explains that titleholders should engage with persons and organisations in their consultation processes, including by adapting consultation processes to the nature of the persons to be consulted. It is to be a genuine and meaningful two-way dialogue.

- A second meeting be held, on Country, at which the attendees will visit the islands off Murujuga. This meeting is to be held on a date after 29 September 2023. Our clients currently have general availability in the first two weeks of October. If you could please let us know Woodside's representatives' availability in that week we can arrange specific dates with our clients.

Spacing the meetings in this way will ensure that our clients have sufficient time to reflect on the information provided so they may make an informed assessment of the possible consequences on their functions, interests and activities.

We confirm we previously provided availability in the week starting 18 September, but our clients now request that the meeting be moved to a later date to due to sorry business occurring in that week, and unavailability of legal representatives in the following week.

We would like to emphasise that it is important that our clients have time to build a relationship with Woodside's representatives, to foster respect and trust, and thereby ensure they feel comfortable sharing information about their functions, interests and activities.

We also anticipate that, after the second meeting, there be a further meeting at which Woodside may explain the appropriate measures it has considered and will adopt to ensure that the impacts of the activities the subject of the Seismic Survey EP are as low as reasonably practicable, in light of the matters raised by our clients in consultation.

The above is similar to our initial proposal of how consultation should proceed, as set out in my email of 25 July 2023.

As to agreed protocols, could you please confirm that we are proceeding on the basis that audio recordings of the meeting are permissible, as agreed at the 25 July consultation. We understand that only women will attend the meetings, for cultural safety.

As to your request for a video, it was our clients' intention to provide to Woodside a video taken on Murujuga. In light of subsequent events that are now the subject of Federal Court proceedings VID 647/2023 Cooper v NOPSEMA & Ors, our clients no longer intend to provide that video, but would instead prefer to consult with Woodside in person.

We refer to previous correspondence which references the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Seismic EP), accepted by NOPSEMA on 31 July 2023, with conditions. Please see the notes below and the attachments.

With reference to Condition 6 of the conditions, we respectfully seek to consult with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines on the Seismic EP changes and the control measures proposed to be adopted to manage potential impacts and risks of the activity to as low as reasonably practicable (ALARP) and acceptable levels. Following consultation, if relevant comments are provided, Woodside intends on submitting to NOPSEMA a report confirming the views of Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, in accordance with Condition 6 b).

We note that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines most recently noted that they would be available for a consultation meeting in the week commencing 4 September 2023. We remain open to consulting with them and would be grateful to obtain their available dates for that meeting in September or sooner.

We otherwise note the following in relation to the relevant conditions regarding consultation.

Condition 1

- 1. Prior to commencement of the activity, the titleholders must consult with registered native title bodies corporate, representative Aboriginal / Torres Strait Islander bodies and other persons or organisations identified as a relevant person in relation to the First Nations cultural heritage in Tables 5-3 and 5-4 of the EP to confirm whether:
 - a. They are aware of any people, who in accordance with Indigenous tradition, may have spiritual and cultural connections to the environment that may be affected by the activity that have not yet been afforded the opportunity to provide information that may inform the management of the activity
 - b. There is any information they wish to provide on cultural features and/or heritage values.

We confirm that, prior to commencement of the activity, Woodside consulted Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, requesting the above information on 3 August and 9 August 2023.

In addition to the extensive consultation opportunities afforded to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines during the preparation of the Seismic EP, Woodside consulted with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines after the submission of the Seismic EP on the following dates:

- 1. A meeting held between Woodside and Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines on 25 July 2023;
- 2. Correspondence exchanged following that meeting, including emails exchanged from 25 July to present.

Condition 2

2. The purpose of the consultation outlined in Condition 1 is to be communicated, and relevant persons are provided with a copy of the NOPSEMA Consultation on offshore environment plans Brochure as part of consultation.

In a number of pieces of correspondence, including those of 3 August and 9 August 2023, Woodside

communicated the purpose of consultation and also provided to Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines, the NOPSEMA Consultation on offshore petroleum environment plans brochure.

Condition 3

3. The method of consultation is informed by the relevant persons being consulted.

Meetings with Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines have been informed by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines. From recent correspondence, Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines requested at least 6 weeks time before having another meeting. Our understanding is that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines intend to provide us with their available dates in September for a meeting on country. As described above, Woodside remains available to meet at your earliest convenience.

Condition 4

4. If at any time, as a result of compliance with Condition 1, relevant persons are identified, they must be consulted in accordance with the NOPSEMA Guideline on Consultation in the course of preparing an environment plan (GL2086).

Woodside notes that Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines have referenced Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation but have not otherwise made us aware of other persons.

Condition 5

- 5. At any time, prior to or during the activity, if new cultural features and/or heritage values of places within the environment that may be affected by the activity are identified that are not described in the EP, the titleholders must:
 - a. Ensure the environmental impacts and risks of the activity continue to be managed to as low as reasonably practicable and an acceptable level.
 - b. Notify NOPSEMA in writing within 7 days of these cultural and/or heritage values of paces and the potential environmental impacts and risks.

Woodside has considered the topics raised by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines at the meeting on 25 July 2023 and has proposed amendments to the Seismic EP, in accordance with Woodside's Management of Knowledge and Management of Change processes. The proposed changes to the Seismic EP are outlined in Attachment A.

Woodside has also notified NOPSEMA, in accordance with this condition, to advise of the topics raised by Ms Alec, Ms Cooper and Save Our Songlines at the meeting on 25 July 2023 and outlined the potential environmental impacts and risks to those topics.

Condition 6

- 6. The titleholders must submit a report to NOPSEMA no later than 14 days after the notification in Condition 5 which confirms the following:
 - a. The control measures that have been adopted to ensure that the environmental impacts and risks of the activity will be reduced to as low as reasonably practicable and an acceptable level.
 - b. The consultation undertaken with any relevant persons to develop those control measures including
 - i.The control measures that those persons considered reasonably necessary to manage impacts on the cultural features and/or heritage values in accordance with indigenous tradition; and
 - ii. The views of the relevant persons in relation to the control measures



As you know, we act for Woodside Energy Ltd, Woodside Energy (Australia) Pty Ltd and Woodside Energy Scarborough Pty Ltd (together, *Woodside*) in relation to the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (*Seismic EP*).

We refer to your recent correspondence to Woodside in which you have asserted that Woodside is in breach of the consultation requirements required by Condition 1 to the Seismic EP. Our client does not agree with the position taken by your client but has engaged with your correspondence nonetheless.

Woodside's position is that it has complied with both regulation 11A of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) (Regulations)* and the conditions of acceptance of the Seismic EP (*Seismic EP Conditions*). In that regard we note the email sent to you by our client earlier today and also refer to *Attachment A* to this letter (which has been prepared by Woodside based on its records) which substantially sets out the history of Woodside's engagement and consultation with your clients.

Notwithstanding Woodside's position that it has complied with both regulation 11A of the Regulations and the Seismic EP Conditions, Woodside is prepared (on a no admission basis) to meet again with your clients at any time and at any place suitable to them so that they can provide any further information that they consider relevant. Our client is happy for your client to contact of Woodside directly to arrange this meeting.

We note that your client has commenced judicial review proceedings challenging the validity of NOPSEMA's acceptance of the Seismic EP. Your client has also foreshadowed that your client might seek injunctive relief preventing Woodside from undertaking any activities under the Seismic EP pending resolution of your client's application for judicial review.

In recent correspondence you have also sought various undertakings from Woodside to the effect that it would not commence any activity under the Seismic EP.

As it presently stands, our client has undertaken that it will not commence activity under the Seismic EP before 2pm Wednesday 23 August. However, following the request in your letter to our client dated 15 August 2023, our client also hereby confirms that it will provide your client with 48 hours' notice before commencing activity under the Seismic EP.

19 November 2021	-	Save our Songlines (SOS) is established by Ms Alec and Ms Cooper
21 November 2021	Meeting in Roebourne	Woodside met with a senior Ngarluma member in Roebourne to discuss SOS affiliations, interests and cultural concerns. The meeting confirmed that cultural interests are held by native title groups, not SOS. Woodside was encouraged to maintain regular engagement with the community.
15 December 2021	Meeting in Dampier	Woodside attended the Murujuga Aboriginal Corporation (MAC) Board and Circle of Elders meeting at the MAC office, Dampier. Ms Cooper was a MAC Board member at the time of the meeting and was present for the introduction. Ms Cooper objected to Woodside's presence. When the MAC Board and Circle of Elders members declined to support Ms Cooper's demand that Woodside be removed, Ms Cooper left the meeting shouting expletives on her way out.

Federal Court proceedings VID647/2023: Cooper v NOPSEMA & Ors

- We refer to the above proceedings and confirm that the Environmental Defenders Office acts
 for the Applicant, Ms Raelene Cooper. We write to seek clarity about the parties' proposed next
 steps, to ensure that the issues between our clients can be resolved in a timely and efficient
 manner.
- 2. We understand from correspondence received yesterday from Mr Blaxill and Mr Rich that the Second and Third Respondents (Woodside) consider that consultation has been completed in accordance with both reg 11A of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) (Regulations) and the conditions at paragraph [133] of NOPSEMA's decision of 31 July 2023 to accept the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Acceptance). You would appreciate from our earlier correspondence, and the matters pleaded in the originating motion under cover of Ground 2, that our client does not accept that consultation has been completed in accordance with either reg 11A, or the conditions in the Acceptance.
- 3. Significantly, you would also appreciate from our earlier correspondence, and the matters pleaded in the originating motion under cover of Ground 1, that our client considers that the Acceptance is invalid. The recent correspondence from Mr Blaxill and Mr Rich did not state a

position on behalf of Woodside in respect of the views expressed in our correspondence, and reflected in that ground, as to the legal invalidity of the Acceptance.

- 4. We welcome Woodside's recent indication that it is willing to consult with our clients. However, we note that on the proper construction of the Regulations, following consultation it will remain for NOPSEMA to consider any amended Environment Plan, and whether it is reasonably satisfied as to the criteria for acceptance of that Environment Plan under reg 10A, including that the plan demonstrates that the consultation required by reg 11A has been carried out. Until that occurs, if Woodside were to undertake activities under the Seismic Survey EP, it would risk doing so in contravention of reg 7 of the Regulations.
- 5. In light of these issues, we consider it to be desirable that the matter be resolved expeditiously, or that Woodside provide an undertaking not to commence any activity under the Seismic Survey EP until the matter is heard and determined by the Federal Court.
- 6. We would be grateful if each of you would advise of your respective clients' positions on the proposal to seek an expedited hearing of the matter, and if Allens would advise of Woodside's position in respect of the undertaking.
- 7. Finally, we would also be grateful if AGS could indicate whether NOPSEMA:
 - a. will take an active role in the proceedings; and
 - b. intends to file the material before the decision-maker at the time of making the decision, or if it will be necessary for EDO to seek an order from the Court for this purpose.
- 8. We look forward to your prompt responses.

Federal Court proceedings VID647/2023: Cooper v NOPSEMA & Ors

NOPSEMA'S role in the proceedings and material before when making the decision

1. We refer to paragraph [7] of our letter of 22 August 2023 in which we asked NOPSEMA to indicate whether it will take an active role in the proceedings and whether it intends to file the material before the decision-maker at the time of making the decision or if it will be necessary to seek an order from the Court for this purpose. We have not received a response and repeat our request.

Order for Case Management

2. We also refer to the correspondence received from the Court on Friday, 25 August 2023. The Court has listed the matter for case management on 7 September 2023, and has encouraged parties to consider orders that may be appropriate and to communicate with the other parties in respect of those orders.

- 3. Subject to NOPSEMA's response to our request noted above, we consider that it would be beneficial for the orderly conduct of the case for the parties to exchange concise statements in accordance with [6.5] to [6.7] of the Administrative and Constitutional law and Human Rights Practice Note (ACLHR-1). Given that both Respondents have now been on notice of the substance of the Applicant's legal arguments since 10 August 2023 we consider that such an exchange should occur in an expeditious manner and in advance of the case management conference. We propose that the Applicant file and serve a concise statement by 4pm on 1 September 2023, and the Respondents file and serve their concise statements by 4pm on 5 September 2023.
- 4. Following the exchange of the parties' concise statements, the parties will then be able to identify what further orders by way of discovery may be required in the proceeding.
 - a. To facilitate an efficient assessment of this, we consider it appropriate that the First Respondent serve a list of all material that was before the delegate at the time of making the Decision the subject of these proceedings by 4pm on 5 September 2023.
 - b. From this list, informed by the concise statements, the parties could then agree on what, if any additional material from NOPSEMA, will be relevant to put before the Court to determine the legal issues in the proceedings, with the First Respondent to file and serve such bundle as agreed by 12 September 2023.
- 5. We then consider that the following procedural orders are appropriate:
 - a. By 4pm on 21 September 2023, the Applicant file and serve:
 - i. any evidence upon which she relies; and
 - ii. an outline of submissions;
 - iii. a list of authorities.
 - b. By 4pm on 28 September 2023, the Respondents file and serve:
 - i. any evidence upon which they rely; and
 - ii. an outline of submissions;
 - iii. a list of authorities.
 - c. By 4pm on 5 October 2023, the Applicant file and serve:
 - i. any evidence and submissions in reply;
 - ii. a list of authorities in reply.
 - d. The parties confer and on or before 8 October 2023 the First Respondent:
 - i. file a Court Book;
 - ii. a joint bundle of authorities in accordance with the List of Authorities and Citations Practice Note (GPN-AUTH).
 - e. The matter be listed for hearing on the next available date after 8 October 2023.
- 6. We **enclose** a draft minute of consent orders, setting out the proposed procedural orders above and look forward to your prompt responses.

As noted in our letter of 30 August 2023, our clients consider that the parties first need to understand when the First Respondent will be in a position to provide the material that was before the decision-maker at the time of making the decision. Federal Court Proceedings - VID 647/2023 - Cooper v NOPSEMA & Anor

- We refer to your letter dated 22 August 2023 relevantly seeking NOPSEMA's
 response on certain matters, and your letter of 29 August 2023 that enclosed a
 minute of proposed orders. We also refer to Allens' letter of 30 August 2023, your
 email in response on 31 August, and Allen's letter in response on the same day.
- Our response to the matters addressed in your correspondence is set out below.
 Further, for the reasons explained below, NOPSEMA does not agree to the applicant's proposed orders.
- However, before addressing those matters and the applicant's proposed orders
 directly, we consider it useful to outline our understanding of the nature of the
 application made by your client in these proceedings.

Nature of the application

- 4. The proceeding has been commenced by way of an originating application for judicial review under s 5 of the *Administrative Decisions (Judicial Review) Act 1977* (Cth) and s 39B of the *Judiciary Act 1903* (Cth).
- 5. Notwithstanding this:
 - 5.1. Only one element of the application seeks judicial review of an administrative decision, being a decision of a delegate of NOPSEMA under reg 10 of the Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations 2009 (Cth) (Regulations) to accept the environment plan resubmitted by the respondents (Woodside) subject to certain conditions applying to operations for the activity (Decision). Further, the applicant advances only one ground of review in respect of the Decision (ground 1).
 - 5.2. The other element of the application, despite being set out as ground 2, is not concerned with judicial review of any administrative decision. Ground 2, read with proposed order 3(b), proceeds in the alternative to ground 1 on the basis that the Decision is lawful, but contends that Woodside has not

complied with the conditions imposed by the Decision and, on that alternative basis, seeks to restrain Woodside from undertaking the activity.

NOPSEMA's role in the proceedings

- 6. You have asked whether our client, NOPSEMA, will take an active role in the proceeding.
- At this stage, NOPSEMA considers it appropriate that the Court should make timetabling orders that facilitate its participation. NOPSEMA will consider the extent of its participation as the matter progresses, including in light of the approach and submissions of Woodside. In particular, NOPSEMA considers it appropriate for timetabling orders to be made that provide for Woodside to file submissions before NOPSEMA, which will not only be apt to avoid any unnecessary duplication, but will also facilitate NOPSEMA tailoring its approach by reference to that which is necessary or appropriate to assist the Court.
- 8. In particular, NOPSEMA considers that it may be appropriate for it to make submissions as to its "powers and procedures" including the proper construction of the Regulations and related legislation so as to ensure that the Court receives appropriate assistance. The fact that the Woodside entities are respondents to the application does not entail that NOPSEMA should, especially at this early stage, decide that it should not participate. As "the repository of the powers and responsibilities conferred on it by the legislative scheme under which it made the relevant decision", and as "the only party ... whose participation is governed exclusively by the aims and objectives of the statutory scheme", NOPSEMA is in a "unique" position and may provide appropriate assistance to the Court: see *Zaitsev v Building Appeals Board* [2019] VSC 455, [46]. See also, e.g., *Vincentia MC Pharmacy Pty Ltd v Australian Community Pharmacy Authority* (2020) 280 FCR 397, [5].

Expedited hearing

9. You have asked for NOPSEMA's position on the proposal to seek an expedited hearing of the matter. NOPSEMA agrees that the matter should be heard as soon as reasonably practicable. However, expedition should not be pursued at the expense of fairness, and (as discussed below) NOPSEMA does not consider that the applicant's minute of proposed orders is appropriate in various respects.

Material before the decision-maker

10. You have asked whether NOPSEMA intends to file the material before the decision-maker at the time of making the decision (**Material**). Your client has also proposed orders requiring NOPSEMA to serve a list identifying the Material and then, "with the agreement of the parties", filing and serving any additional material held by NOPSEMA "relevant to the determination of the proceedings". We also note that Allens, in its letter of 30 August 2023, has expressed the view that NOPSEMA should provide the Material in order to "better inform the parties of the appropriate timetabling of other interlocutory matters".

- However, it is not apparent to us how the Material, let alone any additional material held by NOPSEMA, is relevant to the application.
 - 11.1. Ground 1 (the judicial review element of the proceeding) contends that NOPSEMA did not have power to make the Decision because the decision-maker was <u>not</u> satisfied that the environment plan met the criteria in reg 10A(g). Thus, this ground turns only on a question of statutory interpretation. We do not understand how the Material is relevant. We note that the issue in the *Tipakalippa* proceeding, where NOPSEMA consented to an order that it file the material before the decision-maker, was quite different. In *Tipakalippa*, the principal ground of review was that the decision-maker, despite purporting to be satisfied that the environment plan met the criterion in reg 10A(g), could not lawfully have been so satisfied. The material was clearly relevant to that case; it does not appear relevant to this case.
 - 11.2. Ground 2 (the other element of the proceeding) turns on whether Woodside has, since the Decision was made, complied with the conditions imposed by that Decision. The Material before the decision-maker in deciding to make the Decision (including to impose the conditions) appears to us to be irrelevant to this ground, too.
- 12. Further, the Material includes "sensitive information" as that term is defined in reg 4. The scheme of the Regulations is that such information is not to be published: see regs 9(8), 9AB, 11(2A)(b) and (2B), 11B(3)-(5). We do not consider that that would preclude the Court from ordering discovery of the Material in an appropriate case. However, NOPSEMA is not willing to consent to an order for the discovery of the Material in light of the scheme of the Regulations, and the potential impact of the disclosure of "sensitive information" on the willingness of "relevant persons" in other matters to provide information during consultation purposes, unless the Material is relevant to and necessary for the determination of the case. For the reasons outlined above, it appears to us that the Material is neither relevant to nor necessary for the determination of this case.

Proposal for concise statements

- 13. You have suggested that there should be an exchange of concise statements in accordance with ACLHR-1, [6.5]-[6.7], prior to the filing of further evidence and submissions. In your letter of 29 August 2023, you suggest that this would be beneficial to enable the parties to "then be able to identify what further orders by way of discovery may be required in the proceeding".
- 14. However, as explained above, it is not apparent to us how any of the Material is relevant to the judicial review case (ground 1), let alone how any other material may be relevant to this case. Nor do we think that the exchange of concise statements, in advance of detailed submissions, would be useful or efficient in the hearing and determination of the question of statutory construction posed by the case.
- 15. Nor is it clear to us, on the basis of your letter, why concise statements are appropriate for the other element of the case (ground 2).

16. Noting that the Court does not routinely or as a matter of course order the exchange of concise statements, and noting also that your client is seeking expedition, we are not persuaded that there is utility in this proposal. Indeed, we think the proposal for the exchange of concise statements is, if anything, apt to slow down rather than expedite the hearing of the case.

Other issues with proposed timetabling orders

- 17. As stated above, while NOPSEMA does not oppose expedition, we do not consider that the timetable reflected in your minute of proposed orders is appropriate.
- 18. In particular:
 - 18.1. As noted above, we do not consider that an exchange of concise statements is necessary or appropriate.
 - 18.2. We consider that the respondents, collectively, should be afforded more than one week to prepare their submissions, after receiving the applicant's submissions (noting that the applicant have some weeks to prepare the submissions for the case that they have brought). Moreover, as explained above, we think that the timetable for submissions should be staggered, such that Woodside's submissions are filed before any submissions from NOPSEMA.
 - 18.3. We also do not consider it appropriate that the respondents' submissions are filed before the applicant has filed all of her evidence (including reply evidence).
- 19. A further complicating development is that, as we expect that you would know, NOPSEMA was only yesterday (on 31 August 2023) served (by a different lawyer in EDO) with another application for judicial review of the Decision made by a different applicant (Greenpeace Australia Pacific Ltd) based on different grounds.
- 20. Neither we nor our client has yet had the opportunity to carefully consider that application, including how the Federal Court might suitably case manage it in light of the application brought by your client. One obvious possibility is that the two applications might be heard concurrently, with possible implications for the appropriate timetabling orders in respect of your client's application. But we have not had the opportunity to consider that possibility carefully yet, let alone discuss timetabling or other issues with the applicant in the other matter.
- 21. In the circumstances, while we are not satisfied that your client's proposed timetabling orders are appropriate for the reasons outlined above, we are still considering what we consider are the appropriate timetabling orders. We will be in contact soon, and in advance of the case management conference presently listed on 7 September 2023.
- 22. Finally, we advise you that NOPSEMA's counsel in this matter are Nick Wood SC (based in Melbourne) and Cobey Taggart (based in Perth). We would be happy for your counsel to reach out to ours if that would assist.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION REQUESTS – section 24AB NOTICE OF INTENTION TO REFUSE REQUESTS

I refer to your requests to the National Offshore Petroleum Safety and Environmental Management Authority (NOPSEMA) for access to various documents under the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (the FOI Act). The scope of your requests both relate to NOPSEMA's decision made on 31 July 2023 to accept, subject to conditions, the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan (Decision).

The scope of your request received on 11 August 2023 is as follows:

- 1. Copies of the documents upon which the Decision was based, including but not limited to:
 - a. the Decision Brief provided to the Environment Manager Offshore Projects and Seismic (being the delegate who made the Decision);
 - b. any other documents considered by the delegate while making the Decision; and
 - c. internal or external correspondence regarding the matters in subparagraphs a) and b) above.

The scope of your request received on 16 August 2023 is as follows:

- 2. all documents (including, without limitation, correspondence, emails, records of meetings, records of telephone calls and/or file notes) forming communications between NOPSEMA and Woodside Energy Scarborough Pty Ltd and/or Woodside Energy (Australia) Pty Ltd (Woodside) from 1 June 2023 until the present day (inclusive) in relation to the following:
 - a. the Decision to accept the Seismic Survey EP;
 - b. without limiting the above, the conditions imposed on the Decision;
 - c. without limiting the above, submissions by Woodside to NOPSEMA in respect of the Decision;
 - d. without limiting the above, communications sent by the Environmental Defender's Office (EDO) on behalf of the Applicant to NOPSEMA and/or to Woodside.

Except where:

- such documents are addressed to, received from, or copied to, legal representatives from the Environmental Defenders Office;
- such documents fall within the scope of the documents requested in Environmental Defenders Office correspondence dated 11 August 2023 and pursuant to s 15(1) of the FOI Act access to documents held by NOPSEMA that relate to internal and external correspondence regarding the Decision.



Excluding personal information that is:

- a telephone number, physical addresses or email address that is not otherwise publicly available;
- the name of an employee or officer of Woodside or NOPSEMA whose name appears in any
 document where that person is performing administrative functions only (for example, the names of
 personal assistants who may be copied to email correspondence); and
- the name of any NOPSEMA officer who holds a position that is classified at APS-5 or lower.

On 24 August 2023, I sent an email to yourself and Clare Lakewood requesting a convenient time to discuss your requests, however I did not receive a response in relation to a suitable time.

The purpose of this notice is to advise you that I consider that the work involved in processing these requests in their current form constitutes a 'practical refusal reason' under section 24AA of the FOI Act. Specifically, I consider that the work required would substantially and unreasonably divert the resources of NOPSEMA from its other operations due to the size of the requests, combined with the limited resources of NOPSEMA.

On this basis, I intend to refuse access to the documents you requested. However, before I make a final decision on this, you have an opportunity to revise your requests using the 'request consultation process' under section 24AB of the FOI Act.

Reasons for practical refusal

Section 24 of the FOI Act provides that an agency may treat two requests as a single request where the two requests relate to the same documents (section 24(2)(a)) or where the requests relate to documents the subject matter of which is substantially the same (section 24(2)(b)). The scopes of both FOI requests are for documents in relation to the Decision. The first request received on 11 August 2023 seeks 'other documents considered by the delegate when making the Decision' which would include the file notes, records of meetings (etc) requested in the second request of 16 August 2023. The first request also seeks 'internal and external correspondence' in relation to the 'Decision Brief' and 'other documents' which would include the correspondence from Woodside and the EDO in the scope of the second request. Accordingly, I am satisfied that both requests are for the same documents and therefore should be treated as a single request.

I have assessed the work that NOPSEMA would need to do to process your requests, as a single combined request, based on the documents identified as within the scope. My preliminary searches of the material that may fall within the scope of your request will require us to examine over 50 documents containing over 3,500 pages.

Based on the volume of material, the time required to assess the documents, make any relevant deletions and record a decision, I have estimated to be in excess of 346 hours. This is based on a calculation of four minutes per page to assess the documents and additional time to consider exemptions, make any deletions for each document and prepare a decision regarding each document.

In addition, there are 31 third parties who would need to be consulted in relation to their personal and/or business information which is within the scope of the request. The third party consultation process includes; ascertaining which documents are to be sent to which organisation, drafting and sending the



correspondence, redacting others personal information (where required, for example, in sensitive information reports), responding to third parties' queries and drafting letters and reasons for decision for each third party if required. It is estimated that this work will equate to four hours per third party. The total number of hours that I estimate for third party consultation is therefore 124 hours.

The total number of hours that I estimate to process your request is therefore in excess of 470 hours.

FOI resources in NOPSEMA are finite, as most staff members are not trained or available to review documents or make decisions under the FOI Act. NOPSEMA is a small agency, and those staff who are trained in processing FOI requests also have other operational responsibilities and duties to meet on a daily basis. It is not feasible to remove several staff from their usual duties to meet voluminous FOI requests that would unreasonably divert their time and negatively affect the service they deliver on behalf of NOPSEMA in performing its functions.

Additionally, the documents within the scope of the FOI request are also relevant to an application for judicial review which has been sought by the EDO's clients. As such, it would also be unreasonable for NOPSEMA to process the same documents twice for parallel processes.

Given the estimated time and the limited resources of NOPSEMA, in conjunction with the strict statutory deadlines for issuing a decision under the FOI Act, I am satisfied that processing the request in its current form would substantially and unreasonably divert the resources of NOPSEMA from its other operations. I am therefore unable to progress your request until I have consulted further with you on its scope.

Consultation over scope – what you need to do

You now have an opportunity to revise your request to enable it to proceed. You may consult with me either directly, or through a representative, on the scope during the consultation period which is from the date of this notice until close of business **Friday**, **15 September 2023**. You may request that I extend the consultation period if you wish, by writing to me before the end of the consultation period (section 24AB(5)).

In order for your request to be revised in such a way as to progress your request, you will have to reach agreement with NOPSEMA on a scope that would not result in a substantial and unreasonable diversion of the agency's resources.

Please note that section 24AB(8) of the FOI Act provides that the processing time for your request is suspended until you have either:

- Withdrawn your request
- Revised your request, or
- Advised me that you do not wish to revise your request.

If you do not provide a written response to this notice or request an extension of time within the 14 day consultation period, your request will be taken to be withdrawn in accordance with section 24AB(7).



For your information, I enclose a copy of sections 24, 24AA and 24AB of the FOI Act.

Federal Court proceedings VID647/2023: Cooper v NOPSEMA & Ors

1. We refer to your letter of 1 September 2023, responding to our letters of 22 and 29 August 2023. We also refer to Allens' letter of 30 August 2023, our email in response on 31 August 2023, and Allens' letter in response on the same day.

Material before the decision-maker

- 2. In response to our request that NOPSEMA clarify whether it intends to file the material before the decision-maker at the time of the decision (Material), you have advised that NOPSEMA does not consider the material to be relevant to either ground of the application and, therefore, that it will not consent to an order for the discovery of same. We note that Allens, in its letter of 30 August 2023, has, on the other hand, expressed the view that NOPSEMA should provide the Material in order to "better inform the parties of the appropriate timetabling of other interlocutory matters."
- 3. We also note that NOPSEMA's view appears inconsistent with that expressed in correspondence dated 1 September 2023 in respect of certain *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (Cth) requests made by the Applicant. In that correspondence, a copy of which is **enclosed**, in its reasons for deciding to refuse access to the requested documents, NOPSEMA observes that the documents requested are "relevant to an application for judicial review which has been sought by the EDO's

- clients (sic)", and it would be "unreasonable for NOPSEMA to process the same documents twice for parallel purposes."
- 4. However, we do not insist that NOPSEMA file the Material and are content, at this stage, to proceed on the basis of the decision-maker's reasons and the Environment Plan alone. We have not been advised by Woodside what additional material would be relevant to that ground, nor whether there is any material before the decision maker that it would rely on for Ground 2. Accordingly, we reserve our right to call for any further material from NOPSEMA should anything in Woodside or NOPSEMA's responses make it potentially relevant. We reserve our rights generally with respect to discovery given neither party has advised us of their reasoned position with respect to Ground 1—save, in NOPSEMA's case, to deny that we are correct—and Woodside has only done so in a limited way with respect to Ground 2.

The proposal for concise statements

- 5. We remain of the view that concise statements are appropriate in this matter, and, having regard to ACLHR-1, [6.5]-[6.7], entirely conventional.
- 6. We have on two occasions now set out our position—in correspondence and in the originating application—and neither NOPSEMA nor Woodside have responded with any reasoned response as to their position other than to deny we are correct. We consider that the efficient and responsive preparation of submissions would be greatly assisted by understanding the position that the respondents take and for that reason will be requesting them at the directions hearing.

The proposed timetabling orders

- 7. We otherwise understand the respondents not to be opposed to the remaining orders, other than their position that they wish to have further time, and, in the case of the First Respondent, that it wishes to submit and take other procedural steps after the Second and Third Respondents have done so. We note that both parties have been on notice of the arguments on which we rely in some detail for many weeks now, since our original letters of 9 August 2023 and 10 August 2023. However, if the respondents wish to have further time that is a matter for them. We would be assisted, as we expect the Court will be assisted, if you would respond with a clear position as to the orders you seek, including dates.
- 8. We have **enclosed** an amended set of proposed orders reflecting the above observations and with revised dates to assist you. Please respond by **4pm on Tuesday 5 September 2023** so we may consider your specific proposal.

Nature of the application

9. Finally, we agree that Ground 2 proceeds, in the alternative to Ground 1, on the basis that the decision is lawful. We will consider the issue further and will revert to you shortly, including as to any proposal for amendment.

Greenpeace Australia Pacific Ltd v NOPSEMA & Anor – Federal Court of Australia proceedings WAD207 of 2023 and Cooper v NOPSEMA & Anor - Federal Court Proceedings VID 647 of 2023

- 1. We refer to the above proceedings which are both listed for case management hearing before Colvin J on 7 September 2023.
- 2. Each of those proceedings arise from the same subject matter and each seek, amongst other things, judicial review of our client's (**NOPSEMA**) decision of 31 July 2023 to accept, subject to conditions, the Scarborough 4D B1 Marine Seismic Survey Environment Plan pursuant to r 10 of the *Offshore Petroleum and Greenhouse Gas Storage (Environment) Regulations* 2009 (Cth).
- 3. The parties to each of the proceedings have been requested to provide a minute of proposed case management orders to Colvin J's chambers by no later than 10am on 6 September 2023.
- 4. A relevant question for the parties to each of those proceedings is whether, and to what extent, they should proceed to be case managed and heard together. At present, NOPSEMA is not in a position to form a view about that matter and would be grateful to understand the position of the parties (whether by consensus or not) about that matter.
- 5. Whatever the answer to that question, NOPSEMA is not presently in a position to either propose or agree to orders timetabling the matter commenced by Greenpeace to a final hearing, without knowing how Greenpeace intends to prosecute ground one of the originating application.
- 6. In particular, Ground 1 of the application alleges that NOPSEMA's decision was subject to a jurisdictional fact, which did not exist at the time of decision. It is not clear whether Greenpeace intends to prove that alleged jurisdictional fact by relying on expert evidence, the extent of that evidence or how long it will take for any such Greenpeace Australia Pacific Ltd v NOPSEMA & Anor Federal Court of Australia proceedings WAD207 of 2023 and Cooper v NOPSEMA & Anor Federal Court Proceedings VID 647 of 2023

5 September 2023

- evidence to be filed. If Greenpeace wishes to file expert evidence, and the respondents are given an opportunity to file evidence in reply, this will impact the pace at which the matter can proceed to hearing.
- 7. We will of course seek instructions on whatever timetabling orders Greenpeace proposes ahead of the case management hearing, including with the benefit of understanding the position of Ms Cooper and the Woodside parties as to those orders and whether the two matters are to be heard together.
- 8. Noting that any minutes of orders need to be provided shortly, and that the issues affecting NOPSEMA's ability to consider or propose a minute of orders in the Greenpeace matter does not arise in Ms Cooper's application (assuming the matters were not to proceed together), we have **enclosed** a minute of order for that application should it be that the two matters are to be dealt with separately.

- 1. We refer to your letter of 5 September 2023 and proposed orders provided last night under the cover of email at 4.24pm AWST.
- 2. We respond to the matters raised in your letter, and the proposed orders, as follows:
 - a. We refer to our previous correspondence and our proposal for the matter to proceed by way of concise statements. We remain of the view that these remain the most appropriate procedural course to adopt, given that we have not meaningfully been put on notice of your response to our position which has been disclosed to you in some detail in our previous correspondence and the originating motion filed on 17 August 2023.
 - b. We have amended our proposed orders to take into account your proposal for page limits, but consider that it is appropriate for the Applicant to have 15 pages in reply given that none of the Respondents have responded to our requests by indicating their

- substantive position on Ground 1, and the reply will be the first opportunity the Applicant has to address the submission of both respondents on this point.

- d. Although the matter was filed in the Victorian registry of the Federal Court of Australia and our Counsel are Melbourne based, we would agree to final hearing in Perth, provided that interlocutory matters are able to be heard online, and subject to the preference of the Court.
- e. We do not, at this stage, seek for this matter to be joined with any other proceeding.
- 3. We enclose a revised version of our orders for your consideration. We will provide these to the Court this morning, as per the request of the Associate to the Honourable Justice Colvin, before **10am AWST.**

- 1. We refer to:
 - a. Allens' letter of todays' date (Allens Letter of 6 September 2023);
 - b. the respective proposed procedural orders provided to the Court today by AGS (NOPSEMA's Proposed Orders) and Allens (Woodside's Proposed Orders);
 - the Applicant's proposed orders provided to the Court today (Applicant's Proposed Orders); and
 - d. AGS's letter of 1 September 2023 (AGS Letter of 1 September 2023).

Proposed amendments to timetable

2. We have reviewed NOPSEMA's Proposed Orders and Woodside's Proposed Orders. In an effort to narrow the issues between the parties arising at the case management conference tomorrow, we propose the following:

- a. We continue to press for the substance of each of the orders in the Applicant's Proposed Orders, but would agree to a variation in the dates we have proposed to allow for the matter to be ready for hearing by 18 October (in accordance with the date proposed in Order 8 of NOPSEMA's Proposed Orders).
- b. This variation would see the Applicant file and serve her evidence, submissions, and authorities pursuant to Order 4 of the Applicant's Proposed Orders by 4 October 2023 (rather than 11 October 2023), and then bring the dates of each of the subsequent orders forward by one week.

Grounds 1 and 2 should not be heard separately

- 3. We do not consider that Woodside's Proposed Order 1 (and the orders flowing from it) for Ground 1 to be heard separately from any other ground to be an appropriate or efficient course. The originating application pleads two grounds, which are intimately related in both subject matter and legal principle. It is appropriate that they be heard and determined together. To hear them separately risks duplicating the work of the parties and the Court and unnecessarily delaying the resolution of the whole of the controversy between the parties.
- 4. We also consider that Woodside's proposal at paragraph [9] of the Allens Letter of 6 September 2023 that NOPSEMA 'have the primary carriage of the argument about whether it had power to make the Decision' would place NOPSEMA in an invidious position given its status as an independent regulator and statutory decision-maker. While we accept that it is appropriate, in some circumstances, for a decision-maker to take a role in proceedings, 1 prudence and authority dictate that this should be limited. This is particularly so where Woodside is an active contradictor capable of responding to Ground 1, if it does wish to defend the lawfulness of the Seismic Survey EP.

Proposed amendments to the Originating Application

- 5. We refer to paragraph [5.2] of the AGS Letter of 1 September 2023. The Applicant intends to seek leave, pursuant to r 8.21 of the *Federal Court Rules 2011*, to amend the Originating Application. The purpose of the proposed amendments, which in no way affect the substance of the grounds, is to clarify the relationship between Grounds 1 and 2, and to amend a typographical error.
- 6. We **enclose** a proposed Amended Originating Application. Please advise if your clients consent to the Applicant being granted leave to file.

(a) The Applicant refers to and repeats particulars (a)-(f) in Ground 1 above, and in particular paragraphs (e)-(f).

- (b) The First Respondent considered that representatives of Save Our Songlines had requested a second meeting with the Titleholders in order to further understand the Activity and to share information on their functions, interests or activities that may be affected by the Activity, and that this had not taken place before the Seismic Survey EP was submitted: Statement of Reasons at [94(e)].
- (c) The First Respondent considered that there was uncertainty as to whether there was additional information held by First Nations people on the cultural features of the environment, including spiritual and cultural connections to the environment that may be affected by the Activity: Statement of Reasons at [95].
- (d) The First Respondent decided to the accept the Seismic Survey EP subject to certain conditions, including, without limitation, Conditions (1) and (3) set out in the Statement of Reasons at [133], which provided:
 - 1) Prior to commencement of the activity, the titleholders must consult with registered native title bodies corporate, representative Aboriginal / Torres Strait Islander bodies and other persons or organisations identified as a relevant person in relation to First Nations cultural heritage in Tables 5-3 and 5-4 of the EP to confirm whether:
 - a) They are aware of any people, who in accordance with Indigenous tradition, may have spiritual and cultural connections to the environment that may be affected by the activity that have not yet been afforded the opportunity to provide information that may inform the management of the activity.
 - b) There is any information they wish to provide on cultural features and/or heritage values.

• • •

- 3) The method of consultation is informed by the relevant persons being consulted.
- (e) There has been no consultation with the Applicant or Save Our Songlines, at all, or, alternatively, by a method informed by the Applicant or Save our Songlines, since the date of the Decision.

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Pursuant to reg 7(1)(b) it is an offence for a titleholder to undertake an activity in (f)

a way that is contrary to any limitation or condition applying to operations for the

activity under the Environment Regulations.

Orders sought

1. A declaration pursuant to s 16(1)(c) of the ADJR Act or s 39B of the Judiciary Act that

the Decision is invalid and set aside.

2. Alternatively to 1, an order pursuant to s 16(1)(a) of the ADJR Act, quashing or setting

aside the Decision with effect from the date of the order or from such earlier or later date

as the Court specifies.

3. An order in the nature of prohibition and/or an injunction under s 39B of the Judiciary

Act, alternatively, s 16(1)(d) of the ADJR Act or ss 22 and 23 of the FCA Act, prohibiting

or restraining on a final basis:

the Second and Third Respondents from doing any act or thing pursuant to the (a)

Decision or, alternatively,

(b) the Second and Third Respondents from undertaking the Activity otherwise than

after compliance with the conditions to which the Decision is subject.

4. Costs.

5. Such further or other orders as this Court thinks fit.
