- (b) additional Australian companies that were not controlled by the Second Respondent, Mr Papas, being 23 Margaret St, 286 Carlisle Street and 64-66 Berkeley Street, that received funds fraudulently obtained from SMBC L&F;
- (c) two UK companies controlled by the Second Respondent, Mr Papas, being lugis Holdings and lugis UK, that received funds fraudulently obtained from SMBC L&F; and
- (d) three Greek companies controlled by the Second Respondent, Mr Papas, being lugis Hellas, lugis Energy and Mazcon, that received funds fraudulently obtained from SMBC L&F.

In this respect:
  - (a) exhibited at pages 183 to 186 of Exhibit CMM-11 is a copy of a Greek company extract for lugis Hellas and a certified translation of that document (now exhibited at pages 428 to 431 of Exhibit MY1);

Evidence of Prospective Respondents being recipients of funds fraudulently obtained from the Applicant

#### The MRASAs

12. The affidavit of Roger Dobson sworn on 13 July 2021 and filed in these proceedings (First Dobson Affidavit) refers to two agreements and payments made pursuant to those agreements, which may be summarised as follows:

- (a) on 2 August 2018, SMBC L&F entered into a Master Receivables and Acquisition Servicing Agreement with Flexirent Capital Pty Ltd (2018 MRASA) under which it was contemplated that SMBC L&F would purchase receivables from Flexirent arising under contracts entered into between the First Respondent (FEA) as Flexirent's undisclosed agent and third parties;
- (b) on 17 July 2020, SMBC L&F entered into a Master Receivables and Acquisition Servicing Agreement directly with FEA (2020 MRASA) under which it was contemplated that SMBC L&F would purchase receivables from FEA arising under contracts entered into between FEA and third parties;
- (c) between 6 August 2018 and 19 December 2018, four separate Offer Letters were sent by Flexirent and accepted by SMBC L&F under the terms of the 2018 MRASA for a total price of \$29,709,714.14 paid by SMBC to Flexirent. In each case, the receivables sold to SMBC L&F were rental payments for equipment leases that were purportedly owed by Veolia Environmental Services (Australia) Pty Ltd (Veolia). Evidence of each of the payments by SMBC L&F to Flexirent under the terms of the 2018 MRASA (in the form of SWIFT payment confirmations from SMBC L&F's Neo Payment System) is annexed to the Second Affidavit of Roger Dobson sworn 14 July 2021 (Second Dobson Affidavit) at Annexures RD2 to RD5; and
- (d) between 27 July 2020 and 21 May 2021, fifteen separate Offer Letters were sent by FEA and accepted by SMBC L&F under the terms of the 2020 MRASA for a total price of \$83,993,909.47 that SMBC paid to FEA. In each case, the receivables sold to SMBC L&F were rental payments for equipment leases that were purportedly owed by Veolia. Evidence of each of the payments by SMBC L&F to FEA under the terms of the 2020 MRASA (in the form of SWIFT payment confirmations from SMBC L&F's Neo Payment System) are set out at pages 293 to 327 of Exhibit RD1 to the First Dobson Affidavit.
- 13. SMBC L&F asserts in its Statement of Claim filed on 6 August 2021 that, for each of the transactions referred to in paragraphs 12(c) and (d) above, FEA provided to SMBC L&F (either directly or through Flexirent) fraudulent documents, which purported to be issued in relation to equipment leases which did not in fact exist. In the ASOC, SMBC L&F also asserts that in addition to the existing respondents, each of the Prospective Respondents were recipients of the funds fraudulently obtained from SMBC L&F.

## Evidence of receipt of funds - the 2018 MRASA

14. On 8 August 2018, SMBC L&F paid Flexirent an amount of \$14,411,503.49 pursuant to the First 2018 Offer Letter. Flexirent transferred \$7,689,015.40 and \$3,844,507.70 to FE on 8 August 2018 and 17 September 2018 (respectively). SMBC L&F asserts that the following prospective

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respondents were, prima facie, at least partial recipients of the funds transferred to Flexirent by SMBC L&F on 8 August 2018:

### Leave to serve outside Australia

- 26. Australia, the UK and Greece are all parties to the Hague Convention on the Service Abroad of Judicial and Extrajudicial Documents in Civil and Commercial Matters 1965 (**the Hague Convention**). A copy of an extract from the website of the Hague Conference on Private International Law, a global inter-governmental organisation, which lists the countries that are parties the Hague Convention is located at pages 756 to 759 of Exhibit MY1. A copy of the Hague Convention is at pages 760 to 765 of Exhibit MY1.
- 27. Article 3 of the Hague Convention states:

"The authority or judicial officer competent under the law of the State in which the documents originate shall forward to the Central Authority of the State addressed a request conforming to the model annexed to the present Convention, without any requirement of legalisation or other equivalent formality. The document to be served or a copy thereof shall be annexed to the request. The request and the document shall both be furnished in duplicate."

28. Article 5 of the Hague Convention states:

"... the Central Authority of the State addressed shall itself serve the document or shall arrange to have it served by an appropriate agency, either –

(a) by a method prescribed by its internal law for the service of documents in domestic actions upon persons who are within its territory..."

29. Article 10 of the Hague Convention states:

"Provided the State of destination does not object, the present Convention shall not interfere with:

a) the freedom to send judicial documents, by postal channels, directly to persons abroad.

b) the freedom of judicial officers, officials or other competent persons of the State of origin to effect service of judicial documents directly through the judicial officers, officials or other competent persons of the State of destination,

c) the freedom of any person interested in a judicial proceeding to effect service of judicial documents directly through the judicial officers, officials or other competent persons of the State of destination."

- 30. In relation to the UK, the Hague Conference on Private International Law has published on its website:
  - (a) information about the Central Authority and practical information, which appears at pages 766 to 768 of Exhibit MY1; and

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- (b) information about the declarations, reservations and notifications made under the Hague Convention by the UK, which appears at page 769 of Exhibit MY1.
- 31. Based on this information, the UK has made no reservation with respect to Article 10(a) of the Hague Convention and therefore, if leave is granted to serve outside Australia, SMBC L&F proposes to take steps to cause service of the FAOA and the ASOC to be effected on lugis UK and lugis Holdings in accordance with the method of service permitted under Article 10(a) of the Hague Convention, being by way of international registered post to each of the companies' registered offices in the UK.
- 32. In relation to Greece, the Hague Conference on Private International Law has published on its website:
  - (a) information about the Central Authority and practical information, which appears at pages 770 to 772 of Exhibit MY1; and
  - (b) information about the declarations, reservations and notifications made under the Hague Convention by Greece, which appears at page 773 of Exhibit MY1.
- 33. Based on this information:
  - (a) Greece has declared that formal service will be effected only if the document to be served is written in, or translated into, Greek;
  - (b) Greece is opposed to the method of services provided in Article 10;
  - the competent Australian Central Authority shall forward the request to the Greek Central Authority, which is the Ministry of Justice, Department of International Judicial Cooperation in Civil and Criminal Cases;
  - (d) upon receipt of the documents, the Greek Central Authority shall forward them to the competent Public Prosecutor, namely the Prosecutor of the district where the person being served is resident (in this case, Thessaloniki) and the service of documents will be performed by a process server; and
  - (e) the Public Prosecutor or the Greek Central Authority shall then send the Certificate of Service under Article 6 of the Hague Convention to the Australian Central Authority.
- 34. Accordingly, if leave is granted to serve outside Australia, SMBC L&F proposes to take steps to cause service of the FAOA and the ASOC to be effected on Mazcon, lugis Hellas and lugis Energy in Greece, in accordance with Articles 3 and 5 of the Hague Convention by making an application to the Registrar of the Court pursuant to Federal Court Rule 10.64 with a draft



request for service addressed to the Greek Central Authority, together with copies of the pleadings (in both English and Greek) and summaries of them.

Leave to proceed against the Fourth to Fourteenth and Twentieth to Twenty Second Respondents

- 35. On 9 July 2021, Jason Ireland and Jason Preston (**the Liquidators**) were appointed as joint and several liquidators of FF (the Sixth Respondent). A copy of the current ASIC extract for FF is exhibited to this affidavit at pages 37 to 53 of Exhibit MY1.
- 36. On 15 July 2021, the Liquidators were appointed as provisional liquidators of FGFS (the Fourth Respondent). A copy of the current ASIC extract for FGFS is exhibited to this affidavit at pages 1 to 16 of Exhibit MY1.
- 37. On 28 July 2021, the Liquidators were appointed as joint and several liquidators of FG (the Fifth Respondent), TFGC (the Seventh Respondent), Forum Fleet (the Eighth Respondent), Imagetec FS (the Ninth Respondent), Imagetec Solutions (the Tenth Respondent), Intrashield (the Eleventh Respondent), Spartan (the Twelfth Respondent), Iugis (the Thirteenth Respondent) and Iugis Waste Solutions (the Fourteenth Respondent). Copies of the current ASIC extracts for the Fifth and Seventh to Fourteenth Respondents are exhibited to this affidavit at pages 17 to 36 and 54 to 204 of Exhibit MY1.
- 38. On 3 September 2021, the Liquidators were appointed as joint and several liquidators of 26 Edmonstone Rd (Twentieth Respondent), 5 Bulkara St (the Twenty First Respondent) and 6 Bulkara St (the Twenty Second Respondent). Copies of the current ASIC extracts for the Twentieth to Twenty Second Respondents are exhibited to this affidavit at pages 220 to 268 of Exhibit MY1.
- 39. On 12 October 2021, I caused a solicitor at Jones Day working under my supervision, Tom Haystead, to send a letter to the solicitors for the Liquidators, Allens, seeking the Liquidators' consent to SMBC L&F's interlocutory application to proceed against the Fourth to Seventh, Ninth to Fourteenth and Twentieth to Twenty Second Respondents (**the Liquidator Controlled Entities**). That consent was sought on the basis that SMBC L&F would also seek an order that the Liquidator Controlled Entities would be excused from the requirement to file a defence in the proceedings. A copy of the letter from Jones Day to Allens dated 12 October 2021 is exhibited to this affidavit at pages 774 to 775 of Exhibit MY1.
- 40. On the same day, on 12 October 2021, Allens responded to the letter from Jones Day by email indicating that the Liquidators consent to SMBC L&F's interlocutory application to proceed against the Liquidator Controlled Entities on the basis that an order is sought that the Liquidator

Controlled Entities be excused from the requirement to file a defence in the proceedings. A copy of the email from Allens to Jones Day on 12 October 2021 is exhibited to this affidavit at page 776 of Exhibit MY1.

- 41. On 1 November 2021, Tom Haystead sent an email to the solicitors for the Liquidators, Allens, seeking the Liquidators' consent to SMBC L&F's interlocutory application to proceed against the Eighth Respondent, Forum Fleet. That consent was also sought on the basis that SMBC L&F would also seek an order that Forum Fleet would be excused from the requirement to file a defence in the proceedings. A copy of the email from Mr Haystead to Allens on 1 November 2021 is exhibited to this affidavit at page 777 of Exhibit MY1.
- 42. On the same day, on 1 November 2021, Allens responded to the email from Mr Haystead indicating that the Liquidators consent to SMBC L&F's interlocutory application to proceed against Forum Fleet on the basis that an order is sought that Forum Fleet be excused from the requirement to file a defence in the proceedings. A copy of the email from Allens to Mr Haystead on 1 November 2021 is exhibited to this affidavit at page 778 of Exhibit MY1.
